TO HAVE RELAY RACE

INNOVATION IN HIGH SCHOOL MEET

Preparations for State Meet Progressing Well—Fine Prizes Offered

Preparations for the state high school field meet which is to be held here May 20 are going rapidly on. Manager Spangler announced yesterday that the Iowa management will hang up a new trophy cup to be given to the high school winning the mile relay race at the state meet. Heretofore this event has not been included in the list of events but it has become popular of late that it has been included. It is believed that this will prove one of the most popular of the events to be pulled off.

Manager Spangler has made arrangements for the medals which are to be for winners of all of the events and will soon have them on exhibition.

In preparation for the state meet the Iowa track team has been put into excellent condition. The entire two-fifths mile course has been recinded and with a little more packing will be easily the fastest track in the west. It is expected that some of the state records may be broken this year.

Captain Swift of the Iowa team covered himself with glory at the big Philadelphia meet Saturday by defeating the crack easterners in the discus throw and winning this event for Old Gold. It was the first time an Iowa athlete had won victory on an eastern field since the time Johnny Crum gave the easterners pointers in the dashes. Swift won first place in the event but nevertheless disappointed his friends here who had expected him to establish a world's record. His record Saturday was only 114 feet 7 inches. This was due to the cold, raw day. In practice here Swift had repeatedly cleared 125 feet. The world's record is 127 feet held by M. J. Sheridan. The Chicago representatives got

both second and third in the event Saturday and Pennsylvania got fourth.

The Michigan men won four firsts, and in doing so Rose her giant freshman, equaled the world's shot-put record of 48 feet 2 inches, held by Hogan of Ireland. In an exhibition trial, after winning the event, Ross, who is only 17 years of age put the shot 48 feet 3½ inches, but the figures will not stand in the records because they were not made in competition.

Michigans other winners were Doane, Stone, Perry, Kellogg in the four mile relay race for the college championship of America, Hahn in the 100 yard dash, and Schule in the 120 yards hurdle race.

Willis R. Hotchkiss

Willis R. Hotchkiss will speak to the Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. next Sunday. Formerly he was an African missionary but at present is a travelling secretary of the Y. M. C. A. His experiences in Africa were decidedly unique and startlingly. In his words he has eaten everything from ants to Rhinoceros; fought over 40 lions in his inland tramps and had many narrow escapes. Those who have heard him remark upon the eloquence and sincerity of the man. He speaks at the University of Minnesota Wednesday.

Fix For State Meet

The games committee of the Iowa Inter-Collegiate Athletic association met last night and transacted a number of business matters. A design for the new trophy cup was selected and will be ordered immediately. The cup is far superior to the old one which was permanently awarded to Drake last spring after three straight victories at the state meet. It stands nineteen inches high with the base and will be made of quadruple plate silver, with gold lining and at a cost of \$100. On the front are three figures, a jumper, sprinter and shot putter symbolic of the three branches of sports, on the track, the field events and the weights. The contract for medals was awarded. The exact design was not selected, two having been submitted while but one sample was on hand. The gold medals will cost \$15 each. These will be given for first places, silver for seconds and bronze for thirds.

Plans were also discussed for special trains to bear the crowds from over the state to the meet. Formerly two trains have been used, besides extra cars on regular trains from Ames and Simpson. In the past, each year specials have been run from Iowa City and Grinnell on the Rock Island and from the state normal at Cedar Falls on the Great Western. An effort is being made to secure a train from Cedar Rapids from where Coe college will send a large delegation.

The baseball game which was to have been played on Iowa field this afternoon between Iowa and Nebraska has been called off on account of the wet diamond due to the continued rains. Manager Spangler wired the Nebraska management in Des Moines yesterday that the game would have to be called off, so that no expense will fall upon the Iowa end of it.

The Nebraska team has had a string of hard luck since it started on its trip. The game which was to have been played in Des Moines Saturday with Highland Park had also to be called off on account of rain. The Nebraska team is due to play Decorah tomorrow and this game may also have to be called off. On the following day they will play Chicago at Chicago.

Iowa's trip to the south which was to have begun tomorrow may have to be called off also on account of rain. Manager Spangler received a telegram yesterday from the manager of the Kansas team that it might not be possible to play at Kansas City this week. The team was to play Missouri at Columbia Thursday and Kansas at Kansas City Friday.
