FRENCH PLAY STORY

VERY AMUSING AND ENTERTAINING

Promises to be One of Good Presentation and Excellent Humor on May 5

All arrangements for the French play which is to be presented at the opera house Thursday night by the Alliance Francais have been completed. The cast is spending this week in putting on the finishing touches to their art and promise to be at their best when the curtain rises Thursday night. The play to be presented is the French comedy, "Le Medicin Malgre Lui" by Moliere. A synopsis of it follows:

"As the curtain rises Martine and her husband Sganarelle a wood-cutter are quarreling over his drunkenness, and general worthlessness and he gets decidedly the worst of the bargain until he begins beating his irate wife. Hearing her scream M. Robert, a neighbor interferes, only to have the wrath of the two turned on him and be driven from the scene. A peace making scene follows where Martine pardons only in her words, vowing vengeance the moment his back is turned. Her opportunity soon presents itself in the form of two peasants, Lucas and Valtre who are seeking a specialist who will cure their sick mistress. She tells them that her husband Sganarelle is a famous doctor; but that he is so peculiar that he will not confess it. That he amuses himself by cutting-wood, and that the only way to make him use his marvelous gifts is to beat him until he gives in. She directs them to the wood where he is making his fagots and they after using every other method thrash him until he owns up that he is a doctor, and departs with them for their sick mistress.

"He examines the patient, Lucinde who has chosen to become dumb because her father Geronte will not allow her to marry Leandre. The doctor discovers the reason of her illness and soon she speaks after some interviews with her lover whom the doctor has disguised as his assistant. Her father at first overjoyed is soon sorry for all she will say is that she will never marry and but Leander. But the wise doctor promises to cure her of this phase of the malady also and sends her to walk in her garden with his assistant who takes the hint and elopes with Lucinde. The elopement once discovered the irate father sentences the poor doctor to be hanged. Martine arriving just in time cheerfully stands by to encourage him in death. But Leandre has thought better of his honor and brings Lucinde back.

FOOTBALL MEN OUT

IOWA'S PROSPECTS ARE GOOD FOR FALL

Old and New Material Present Practice Begins this Week Chalmers Talks

If the enthusiasm shown at the meeting of the football men last night is any criterion, Iowa is to have a football team that will win glory next fall. About twenty-five men turned out last night to a meeting called by Coach Chalmers to talk over the football outlook next fall. Plans for a little spring training were discussed as well as the work for next fall. The men in attendance at the meeting consisted of many of last year's squad which did such efficient work on the gridiron and a large number of new men who have decided to try for gridiron honors.

Beginning tomorrow the men will have practice daily. The backs will take three days a week running and catching punts and in kicking. The line men will take short runs daily and will also do practice starting on the line. The backs will also do the starting stunt to give them speed in getting away with the ball.

Coach Chalmers gave the men a very encouraging talk last night and it had a good effect. Iowa university football never started under more favorable auspices. The excellent work accomplished by Mr. Chalmers with the team last fall leads to belief that still greater wonders will be accomplished during his second year here.

May Succeed Harriman

The question of Dr. John Harriman's successor may be settled. Dr. John M. Shaw a graduate of the university of Pennsylvania medical school and later lecturer on anatomy in that school is here this week delivering lectures before the medical classes in anatomy. It is understood that he has been offered the place and is here deciding whether or not to accept it. He has created a favorable impression among the students of the medical department. WILLIS R. HOTCHKISS

SPOKE TO Y.M.C.A. AND Y. W. C. A. SUNDAY

His Experiences Varied and of Great Interest—Encounters Many Lions

Willis R. Hotchkiss spoke to a union meeting of the Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. last Sunday afternoon at the Congregational church. The appeal of the man was irresistible. Many of his experiences are decidedly hair raising. The territory upon which he works is 600 miles in the interior of Africa just north east of Lake Victoria. The region is inhabited by the Kavirondo. While here he displayed the manuscripts which held the only evidence of a language of a million people which he is gradually moulding into form. For four years he was alone; buried three companions and in one year encountered forty lions, three times being directly attacked by them several times by rhinoceri. He also was repeatedly ambushed by nations. For fourteen months he never saw a piece of bread and for two months he lived upon sour milk and beans.

IOWA'S MEN IN CLOSE AND FAST FINISHES

A Warm Day, No Wind and a Fairly Good Track Bring Out Many Contestants

Saturday was just warm enough and with scarcely nowind to make it an ideal track day. The track was too soft to hope for any broken records. It is somewhat doubtful to which class the Chantland cup belongs. If Donovan registers as a junior law the cup will probably go to them with 15 points. The freshman collegiates and dents are close competitors for the honor. Coyle and the Davis boys did some remarkable work as freshman.

The only record broken was the home record of the 2 mile run, which Jeffers clipped six seconds. Swift threw the discus a greater distance than in Philadelphia last week, but he had better weather to help him. He did not equal his record, however.

The Civil Service will hold on June 1 and 2 examinations for salaried positions in the government laboratories at Manila P. I. The positions are in the biological, chemical, serum, pathological, bacteriological, and entomological laboratories. The positions carry with them salaries of from \$1400 to \$1800 the first year, with chance for promotion to salaries of as high as \$3500. To take this examination a college degree is required, and special credit is given for post graduate work. Original research work and special training in these lines will also be given credit. 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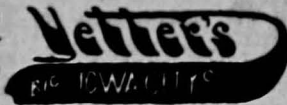
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A MAY BREAKFAST
