## STATE RECORDS FALL TODAY

Most Successful Meet in the History of Iowa High School Athletics—The Summaries

Five weather and a good crowd greeted the annual meet of the Iowa high schools at Iowa City today. Flying colors, tooting horns and long, loud cheers greeted the winners of the various events as they crossed the tape ahead of their competitors.

It is estimated that there are more than two thousand people in the city today to attend the meet. Of this number nearly three hundred are athletes who participated in the events this afternoon. The remainder consists of delegations of rooters from the various high schools represented.

The biggest crowd from any one place came from Des Moines on the special train which arrived shortly before noon. Over two hundred came on this. There were many girls in the delegation.

The forenoon was taken up with the preliminary events at the park. They proved to be very exciting. Murphy of Ida Grove who was looked upon as a sure winner in both hurdle events met with a bad fall in the low hurdles and was disqualified. He won his other hurdle event with ease.

The dashes required six preliminary heats to weed out the poor ones.

The track was in beautiful shape and state records were smashed in several instances. Cohn of Grinnell lowered the record in the hundred yard dash from 10 2-5 to 10 1-5. Hubbard of Ida Grove lowered the 440 yard record from 53 to 52 1-5. Shepard of Des Moines lowered the 120-yard hurdle record from 17 2-5 seconds to 16 3-5.

Excellent order was maintained at the scene of the contest. Only those with special privileges were permitted on the field. All others occupied places in the grand stand filling it to its fullest capacity.

The officials who had the meet in charge did very creditable work. There was not the usual delay between heats. The weight events were pulled off contemporaneously with the runs and nothing was permitted to drag.

The first event to be pulled off was the hundred yard dash. The result was a surprise inasmuch as Millspaugh of Davenport was considered a sure winner. Cohn

of Grinnell got first in the remarkable time of 10 1-5 seconds. Bauton of Waterloo was second and F. Gates of Capitol Park Des Moines third.

In the half mile bike, Taylor of East Des Moines got first easily with Heidt, West Des Moines second and Andrus Council Bluffs third. Time 1:22

There were twenty two starters in the half mile run. It was tremendously exciting. It was won by Rob Gates of Capitol Park Des Moines, Andrews East Des Moines second; Miller, Storm Lake third. Time 2:06 3-5.

In the 440 yard final, Hubbard Ida Grove first; F. Gates, Capitol Park second; Bauton, Waterloo third. Time 52 1-5. Hubbard established a new state record in this event, the previous record being 53 seconds.

In the hammer throw Jordan, West Des Moines, won 131 ft. 2 in.; Paul, Waterloo, 128-8 1/2; Fawcett, Ida Grove, 128-1 1/2.

Cohn of Grinnell got first in the 220 yard dash; F. Gates, Capitol Park second; McIntosh, Grinnell. Time 23 2-5.

In the 120 hurdle, Shepard of East Des Moines won; McCord of West Des Moines second and Bair of West Des Moines third. Time 16 2-3.

In the two mile bicyclerace, Hull of Cedar Rapids won; Taylor, East Des Moines second; Cubbage, Ida Grove third. Time 6:30 4-5.

In 220 yard hurdle, Bair of West Des Moines won with Storer of West High second, Brown of Waterloo third. Time 28 3-5.

The mile run resulted in a victory for Cook of Independence; O'Connell, East Des Moines second; Brasnahan, Ida Grove, third. Time 4:51 2-5.

The pole vault went to Shepard of East Des Moines at 10 ft 2 in.; Swingle, Oskaloosa, second; Harris, West Des Moines, third.

Royal of North Des Moines got the shot put at 40 ft. 9 in.; Russell, Oskaloosa, second, 39 ft. 5 in.; Murphy, Ida Grove, third, 38 ft. 8 1/2 in.

Chalmers the protested Capital Park athlete, won the discus with 101 ft. 6 1/2 in.; Russell of Oskaloosa, second with 100 ft.; and Jordan of West Des Moines third with 88 ft. 4 in.

High jump—Engstrom, Marion, 5:4 1/2; Snyder, W. Des Moines, 5:3 1/2; Pickerell, N. Des Moines, 5:3 1/2; Pickerell jumped off tie with Soper of Davenport.

Broad jump—Engstrom, Marion, first; Millspaugh, Davenport, second; Cohn, Grinnell, third. Distance: 20 feet, 10 inch.

### Notes of the Meet

The university band did excellent service throughout the day.

The special train from Des Moines carrying the Des Moines high school rooters arrived in Iowa City shortly before noon. There were several hundred of them and they made noise in great quantities for their respective high schools this afternoon.

The university students from various parts of the state were divided against each other this afternoon. They all joined their home cohorts and rooted in S.U.I. style.

American Amateur Athletic Association rules govern all competitions.

First place counts five points to the school winning it; second place, three points; and third place, one point.

A Gold Medal is given in each event to the contestant winning first place; a Silver Medal to the winner of second place.

A Gold Medal will be given to the individual winning the greatest number of points.

A Silver Trophy Cup will be given to the school winning the Relay Race, and smaller Silver Cups to each of the four contestants on the winning relay team.

The Meet is under the direction of the Athletic Union of the University of Iowa.

The first inning was a disastrous one for Iowa. A hit combined with errors by McGregor and Moss gave the visitors three runs. Iowa got one run in the first and then kept piling them on one by one until the lead of the visitors was passed and then some. Grinnell did not see home after the first inning.

Cratzmeyer for Iowa pitched a lovely game allowing only two hits. He had five strikeouts.

Iowa's rooting has shown a decided improvement under the guidance of Garretson. There was lots of enthusiasm this morning. The Grinnell high school students did a good line of rooting for the visitors.
