GEOLOGIST RESIGNS

PROF. SAMUEL CALVIN GIVES UP STATE JOB

Iowa Survey Numbers Thirteen Volumes—Dr. Wilder May Be Next State Geologist

Professor Samuel Calvin has tendered to Gov. A. B. Cummins his resignation as state geologist and head of geological survey of Iowa in order to devote all his time to his work as head of the department of geology in the state university and to his private work. Dr. Calvin has filled the position he now leaves for twelve years, ever since the Iowa geological survey was established. In that time a study of the geology of every county of the state has been practically completed, filling thirteen large volumes. The minerals of the state have been fully classified, and the work of the survey has been fully classified, and the work of the survey has been of inestimable value to the manufacturers and producers of the state. Dr. Calvin is an acknowledged authority on the geology of Iowa and is called upon frequently to give his opinions on this or that subject.

Dr. Calvin's successor will be chosen by the geological board, and it is thought that the choice may fall upon Dr. Frank Wilder, professor of economic geology and mining in the university and who has been assistant state geologist of Iowa as well as state geologist of North Dakota. He is a man of fine ability and broad training, and is considered to be the logical successor to Professor Calvin.

That this attack should be made by an alumni organization is uncertain and improbable since it lacks the judiciousness and sane policy which generally characterize the proceedings of any alumni body. That it might be the attack of an individual inspired by a personal motive is hard to believe for such an attack to receive credence at all should be signed. Thus far to all appearances it seems to be another outbreak of yellow journalism. The untruthful quoting of the University faculty and their prompt denial of any statements whatsoever and the impossibility of finding the source or foundation of the many reports would seem to demand that public opinion be suspended and no credence at all be given

to such vague and unauthorized reports. When dollars and cents appeal more to such journalism than honor and truth it is difficult for one to keep silent. In a land where free speech and the liberty of the press is maintained it is not strange that a few abnormal species should result once in a while. It is a matter of evolution simply. Not until public sentiment maintains a stricter censorship upon its own credulity will we ever hope to be free of such. The higher one proceeds in the scale of life the fewer parasites one finds in evidence. But the virulence and tenacity of the few however is startling. For once in the history of the world let the human race condemn such undesirable detestable growths.
