IOWA TEAM LEAVES

ATHLETES LEFT TODAY FOR CHICAGO

Michigan Will Probably Win First Honors Tomorrow—Chicago is Strong

The athletes who are to represent the state university of Iowa in the conference meet of the Big Nine at Marshall field tomorrow left at 11:20 o'clock this morning for Chicago. They will arrive in the windy city this afternoon and get a good rest before the tests of strength tomorrow afternoon. The team is composed of Captain Swift who will enter the discusthrow; Ross who will enter the broad jump; Barker for the high jump; Jeffers for the two mile run; Crane for the shotput; the mile relay team composed of Davis, Miller, Young and Coyle together with Rivers. The members of the relay teams will enter the runs for Iowa.

Iowa looks good for several points. If Swift happens to be in good form he should land the discus throw although Rodman of Illinois and Rose of Michigan will hurry him. Barker can go as high as the conference record in the high jump and Ross will make them jump 23 feet to beat him. The Iowa relay team will run the mile in less time than the former conference record and unless some of the other schools spring surprisingly fast teams Iowa will win this event.

In a dope sheet prepared by the Chicago Maroon, Iowa is given first in the broad jump but is not conceded points in the discus throw. First place in this event is given to Chicago with Michigan second.

Concerning the meet the Record Herald says:

At Marshall field and in the hotel lobbies the talk always drifted to speculation as to how much Michigan's chances would be affected by the outsiders. On nearly every hand Michigan was a favorite for first honors. But there were few who believed that Michigan will have an easy fight. Every one admits that the contest will be fought out to the end, and that even the slightest reversal of form by one of the favorite wolverines may result in a victory for Chicago.

In reckoning the events more than half a dozen doubtful contests enter into consideration, which cannot be figured out closely. The 100 yards dash, the 220, the quarter and half mile are the four events in which Chicago's strongest men will meet the brightest Michigan stars, and these events are likely to decide the meet. Should Chicago overcome the wolverines in the majority of these, the conference may go to the Midway team.

There will be an important meeting of the debating league tonight.

WOULD RAISE MONEY

SCHEME TO HELP ATHLETIC UNION

Puritan Manufacturing Company Would Give Union a Percentage on Sales

A scheme to help the university athletic union raise money has been proposed by the promoters of the Puritan Manufacturing Company of this city. The company solicits the cooperation of university students in selling its goods throughout the state and offers in return a certain percentage of the receipts to the University Athletic Union. Manager Spangler believes the plan is a good one and urges that all members of the university who might have some influence in disposing of a case of jewelry to his home merchants to see him about doing a good turn for the union which needs the money.

The plan suggested by the Puritan company is as follows:

That company will furnish jewelry of its manufacture to the Athletic union at the actual cost and expense. The cost is the actual cost of the goods; the expense is the expense of putting this proposition before the merchants and students and consists mostly of office expense, and printed matter. The Puritan Manufacturing company makes this offer on the condition that the students and alumni of the university will exert their energies toward selling this jewelry to the merchants of the state on little lots of \$15 or \$20 each.

The Athletic union's share in every \$15 assortment is 45 per cent, or \$5.25. Therefore one thousand of these assortments would amount to \$5,250 to the athletic union.

The Puritan people will go even farther. The company will that 35 per cent on every dollars worth of goods, sold as above outlined, the coming year, and thereafter while the contract endures—up to \$50,000 a year. This would make a gift of \$17,500.

At a meeting of the committee representing the different colleges yesterday, additional conveners were appointed to call together the students from other counties which no effort has yet been made to organize. Snedcor for Cherokee; H. Quafe for Chickasaw; H. W. Barnes for Clayton; R. R. Randall for Crawford, H. C. Anderson for Fayette; H. M. Ivins for Grundy; N. W. Jones for Hardin; E. J. Barker for Howard; R. E. Jones for Iowa; J. W. Coggsell for Linn; F. R. Molsberry for Lousia; E. A. Rule for Polk; E. R. Jackson for Potawattamie; J. W. Meyer for Sioux; F. R. Hutchinson for Wayne; B. B. Burnquist for Webster and F. R. Wilson for Woodbury.

The conveners are free to call meetings of the students of their respective counties upon the strength of this announcement of their appointment.

The following brief constitution has been drafted to govern the organization of the student clubs.

This organization shall be known as the Iowa University Club of—

"Any person who is or who has been at any time a student of the University of Iowa is eligible to become a member of this organization, and shall be considered a member by virtue of such eligibility.

"The officers of this organization shall be elected annually at some meeting held during May or at a meeting duly called for this purpose.

"The President shall represent this organization at all meetings of which this organization shall be entitled to a representative.

"The organization is formed with a view of facilitating a closer bond of fellowship among the university students of this county and of promoting the inter sets of the university."

IOWA NEXT TO TOP

BEATEN BY MICHIGAN ALONE AT TENNIS

Monnet and Bailey Were Stars In Big Nine Tennis Tournament at Chicago

Chicago, June 2—The last match of the Western Inter-collegiate Tennis tournament was fought out between Michigan and Iowa today. As was expected Michigan won rather easily although a great many of the games were very close, there being an unusually large number of deuce games. The combination of Michigan players was irresistible. Hunt was brilliant and accurate, while Lee was almost certain in returning the ball. The score which showed how the match was won, was as follows:

Michigan—Places 23, Outs 24, Nets 17, Double faults 3.

Iowa—Places 8, Outs 29, Nets 27, Double faults 5.

Thus the Michigan players won both singles and doubles and four of the prizes, while the Iowa men won the other two. The prizes won by Iowa were two sole leather racket cases costing \$15.00, donated by Spalding & Co. The score of the final match was 6-2, 6-0, 6-2.

By way of information for Iowans, it may be said that Lee Michigan's second man, had defeated several intercollegiate champions to win his place on the Michigan team this year, while Hunt, their star player, has won many championships. He has toured the country to play in tennis tournaments for the past three summers after playing at college, and won no fewer than fourteen prizes last summer alone.

When the Iowa players left Iowa City they said that they hoped to defeat every college meet except Michigan. This they did and the Iowa players were the only ones who were able to win a set from Michigan and make a dangerous fight for the championship.

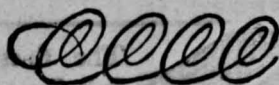
