Is on University of Alabama Program

The University is in receipt of an invitation to the Seventy-Seventh Commencement of the University of Alabama, to be held at Tuscaloosa, May 23rd to May 27th, on which occasion President MacLean is to give the commencement oration. The "commencement sermon" is to be given by Dr. Henry Van Dyke and the "oration before Society of Alumni" by Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota.

The exercises are much after the order of all commencement exercises, with the exception that the play, "The Taming of the Shrew" this year is given twice, the second performance being out of doors.

A feature of the program which might be pleasing in a Northern commencement is two games of baseball, Louisiana vs. Alabama.

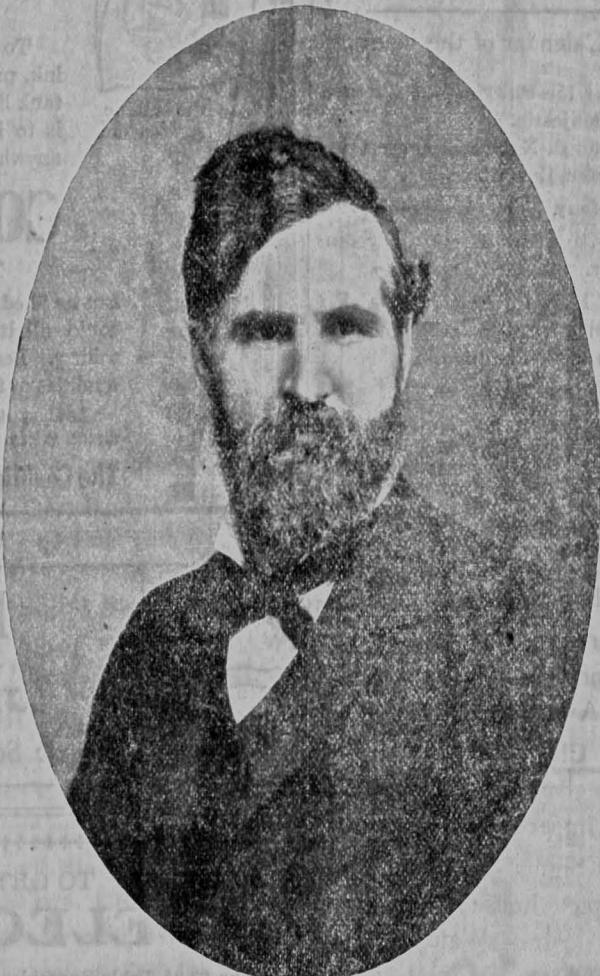
PROF. GUTHE RECEIVES AN APPROPRIATION
