## CROWD BRINGS DEFEAT IN STATE TITLE GAME

FREE THROW AWARDED LOSES  
20 TO 19 BATTLE

Captain Carney of Grinnell Saves Tie  
by Fouling as Gardner Throws  
Basket

Unseemly actions by the crowd at the Iowa-Grinnell game Friday evening cost the Hawkeye team its best chance at the state title. After suffering the hoots and jeers of a part of the spectators for some time, Referee Law finally awarded Grinnell another free throw. Slutz dropped the ball in the basket, and Grinnell had the one point necessary to give a winning margin, 20 to 19.

Except in the matter of free throwing, the Iowa team played a superior game throughout. The visitors had surprisingly little teamwork, depending entirely on a long pass to Slutz, who seemed little hampered by his recent deadly(?) injuries. The Hawkeyes had the ball three-fourths of the time, and kept up a continual long distance bombardment of the basket. Eight field goals resulted, and a few easy shots missed. Grinnell got six field goals, four made by Slutz, who camped under the Iowa basket and occasionally eluded Maiden because of his superior height. Slutz, however, threw eight goals from the foul line, one being awarded as a result of the actions of the "roughneck" element in the crowd, while Schmidt cashed in three chances for Iowa.

The finish was wildly exciting. With a minute to play, Grinnell was leading 20 to 18. The Iowa team, coming stronger every minute, was fighting hard to overcome a lead which the visitors had held all through the half, and had the ball in Grinnell territory continually. Gardner had just shot an easy basket from a perfect signal play. With the time almost gone, he took another short pass from Sallander under the basket and shot the goal which should have tied the score. But as Sallander passed the ball, Carney of Grinnell fouled him, and Law's whistle sounded as Gardner tossed the basket, costing the two points. Schmidt threw the foul, but the pistol was fired as he did so.

Iowa started strong and led until the last five minutes of the first half. Then Slutz began to get away from Maiden and the count at the end of the period was 11 to 8 in favor of the visitors. The second half was all Iowa's, but Slutz kept up his good work from the foul line. Maiden went out because of four fouls, and Schmidt went back to guard with Leo at center. Slutz never had a chance with the captain guarding him and the game would have developed into a procession but for two or three easy baskets missed by the Iowa sharpshooters. Grinnell had no chance to score and was compelled to play a strictly defensive game

SIGMA XI ELECTIONS MADE:  
THIRTEEN STUDENTS CHOSEN

Two Faculty Members Also Elected  
into Society

Thirteen students, who have shown exceptional ability in scientific research, have just been made members of the Sigma Xi society, one of the most prominent honorary scientific fraternities in the United States. They are Ernest Otto Dietrich, of Dubuque; Helen Russ, of Davenport; Albert E. Crase, of Hawarden; Lloyd B. Davidson, of Sioux City; George E. Engstrom, of Marion; Harry Garfield, of Creston; Maurice A. Repass, of Dexter; Frank E. Young, of Logan; Nellie D. Fisher, of Troy Mills; Margaret M. Shercliffe, of Solon; Thomas F. Vance, of Shenandoah; Homer I. Dodge, of Ogdensburg, N. Y.; and Luther E. Widen, of Austin, Texas. Two members of the faculty were also elected; they are Professor John T. McClintock, vice dean of the college of medicine, and J. B. Hill, assistant professor of electrical engineering.

Practically all of the prominent scientists of the United States are members of the Sigma Xi fraternity, which has twenty-eight chapters in the leading universities that teach science.

### Packard to Coach

L. A. Packard has been chosen as assistant track coach for the coming season. He will have full charge of the freshman track team and will help Kellogg with the varsity.

Packard is a student in the medical college at present. He has had considerable track experience, putting in four years of training at Mercersburg Academy, the famous eastern prep school, and the same time as a member of the track squad at Michigan. He was coach at the University of Colorado before entering the medical school here. Packard's specialty was the pole vault, he has also run the hurdles and has had some experience with almost every department of track work.

WINS OVERTIME CONTEST YESTERDAY 14 TO 12

The strong dent team proved that it is to be a serious contender for the inter-department title by defeating the liberal arts yesterday in what was perhaps one of the most sensational games ever played in the inter-department league. The score was tied by the lit team, which was composed largely of members of the varsity squad, thirty seconds before the end of the regular period, the count being 8 to 8. The collegiates rallied strongly in the extra five minutes, and were leading by two points with one minute to play. But the dent team came in strong in the last minute, scoring two field goals and winning 14 to 12. Nothing better in the way of satire has been conceived concerning Iowans than some of the acts as planned by the Dramatic club. The scene opens in the sitting room of a local sorority house and after several sharp situations, the team present several "new ones," familiar to most of the students. Our sins have found us out. The law of compensation and of retribution has overtaken the followers of the Iowa basketball team, and the lesson was brought home in unusually direct fashion. As a result of the utterly unsportsmanlike and inexcusable actions of a part of the crowd at the game Friday night the Iowa team lost a game which it certainly deserved to win, and with the game probably went its chances for the state championship.

It is hard that the team should be thus cheated of that for which it worked so hard, but it comes as a fitting climax to the scenes which have taken place at every important game this year. No fair-minded person who understands the game could take exception to the work of Referee Law, who performed a hard task in a faultless style. The only explanation is that of hoodlumism in its worst form. The extra free throw given to Grinnell because of the hoots and jeers of the crowd gave the visitors the one point which won the game.

There is a Nemesis which follows the evil-doer and punishes him surely and certainly for his misdeeds. But it is not often that the result is as clear and obvious as now. There is room for a good deal of Sunday meditation in the outcome of the savoring conduct of the spectators at Friday's game.

**DR. HENRY ALBERT**

Professor of Pathology and Bacteriology, and Director of the State Board of Health Bacteriology Laboratory

Henry Albert was born at Wolcott, Iowa, and received his early training in the Reinbeck high school. In the fall of 1896, he entered the State University of Iowa, graduating from there in 1900, with the degree of Bachelor of Science. He continued his studies here and in 1902 was graduated with the degree of Master of Science and Doctor of Medicine. He continued his studies the next year at the University of Austria at Vienna. Returning from there he was appointed instructor in pathology and bacteriology. The following year, 1904, he was appointed successor of Dr. Biering as professor of pathology and bacteriology, which position he now holds.

In 1905 he was appointed director of the state board of health bacteriology laboratory, a department which he was instrumental in organizing. He has held this position ever since his appointment to it. This department has proven a boon to practitioners of the state in that it makes examinations of tubercular sputa, rabies victims, and the like, free. The appropriation has grown from \$2,500 in the first year to \$6,000 last year. The number of examinations has also grown remarkably. In 1905

there were 3,000 as compared with 12,800 last year.

Another institution that has prospered under the careful manipulation of Dr. Albert, is the pathological museum. When Dr. Albert took charge of the department there were only about seventy-five specimens in the pathological museum, now there are over 3,000. There are also among the specimens some very rare ones, some even that the large Harvard museum has been unable to procure.

Dr. Albert is a member of the American Medical Association, the American Public Health Association, the American Association of Pathologists and Bacteriologists, the American Bacteriological Society, the International Association of Medical Museums, Sigma Xi, Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Iowa Academy of Science, the Iowa State Medical Society, and other state and local societies.

Dr. Albert is a frequent participant on the programs of the societies of which he is a member, and a frequent contributor to the journals dealing with the subjects in which he is interested.
