VESPER CONCERT SCORES BIG HIT

Large Audience Pleased by Musical Program at Vespers Last Sunday

The vesper choir gave their second concert Sunday afternoon to a large and appreciative audience. The concert was a rare musical treat, such as has not been heard in Iowa City for some time.

The vesper choir comprises the men's glee club and the women's glee club united under the leadership of Professor Robert Fullerton and numbers forty voices, each of which has been trained. Their singing showed careful preparation and training and reflected great credit on the ability of Prof. Fullerton. The rendition of Grieg's "Discovery" showed Prof. Fullerton's art in bringing out the fine points of a composition. It cannot now be said that music at the university is not the equal at least, of music anywhere in the state.

The vesper choir was assisted by Miss Maude Messner of the women's glee club, Mrs. Riedel of the school of music, and Mrs. Frank B. Whinery of Iowa City as soloists, and also by the university quintet, which includes Prof. Riedel, Miss Eastman and Prof. Schoettle, of the school of music and Mr. Falk and Mr. Hazlett. They rendered two selections, "Melodies from Faust" and "Salut d'Amour." The "Melodies from Faust" was especially pleasing. Mrs. Riedel sang "Ave Maria" to the pleasure of each member of the audience. Mrs. Whinery played two harp solos that were delightful.

An interesting event not on the program was the entrance of Dr. John C. Parish as the choir was singing "Old Gold".

This was the second concert given under the direction of Professor Fullerton and it was indeed a success. The university was very fortunate in securing him for the past year and it is to be hoped that he can be induced to remain for another year.

FACULTY MEMBERS GO TO FORT DODGE

Iowa Professors Will Deliver Ad-
dresses Before Northwestern
Teachers' Association

Professors of the state university
will be prominent in the Northwest-
ern Iowa Teachers' association to be
held in Fort Dodge, March 13, 14,
and 15. In addition to the profes-
sors and instructors who attend the
convention, four members of the
faculty will take leading parts in the
program.

On Friday, March 14, Prof. W. A.
Jessup, director of the school of edu-
cation, will deliver an address on
"School and Society". The same
day he will lead a round table of
high school principals in a discus-
sion on "Should Courses of Study
for Small High Schools be Standard-
ized?" Prof. H. C. Dorcas, also pro-
fessor of education, will meet with
the other members of the board on
"Secondary School Relations", Sat-
urday morning to discuss various
problems relating to schools, inspec-
tion, courses of study, and other
topics. Prof. Geo. T. Kay of the
department of geology will speak
on "Physiography in the High
School." Prof. Charles Bundy Wil-
son's address, "A Few Facts from
My Experience," will set forth les-
sons for high school teachers of ger-
man taken from his experience as
professor of german in the univer-
sity.

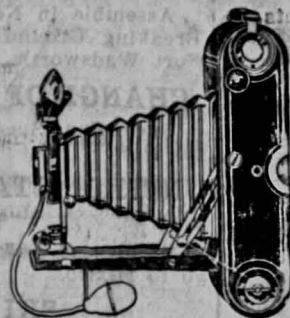

University President Answers Questions on Homeopathic Hospital

President John G. Bowman appeared Friday afternoon at Des Moines before the house committee on educational institutions and answered questions relative to the discontinuance of the chairs of surgery of the homeopathic college of medicine. He gave as a reason for the consolidation of the surgical departments of the two medical colleges that there was need for greatly strengthening the department of surgery by the expenditure of a considerable amount of money, and said that if the legislature wanted to provide the money, two departments might be maintained, but it was useless to attempt to do so unless appropriations for both were forthcoming. The hearing was uneventful. The members of the senate committee were not present.
