As to Be Presented to All Men At Mass Meeting Held in Liberal Arts Auditorium Next Tuesday Evening at 7:30.

One of the most decisive movements furthering the democracy of the university was made Monday morning when half a hundred students met in the Old Capitol building. "Shall Iowa have a real Iowa Union" was the subject under discussion. Every man present expressed himself as heartily in favor of the plan laid out by Mr. Reinow, assistant dean of men.

There has been a long time since fifty men of the university have met together, with such a grim determination to do something really great for the university. The issue was thoroughly discussed and initial resolutions were taken towards organization. A committee of seven men was appointed to outline a definite plan of action, looking forward to future meetings in the near future.

At the next Tuesday evening, there will be a mass meeting held in the Liberal Arts auditorium. The meeting will be called to order promptly at 7:30. At this meeting definite plans of organization will be presented to the student body. Every man in the university who is interested in the development of the democracy of the institution is urged to be present.

NO MORE TANGOS TO BE DANCED AT IOWA

In taking this action the moral side of the question did not enter into the discussion, that phase being considered a matter for individual judgment. But since there is at present a decided opposition to this form of dancing it has been deemed advisable, out of a decent respect for honest public opinion, to forego such dancing.

This decision is most gratifying to all friends of the university, showing as it does the good judgment of the students and their deep interest in all things that affect the prosperity and reputation of their alma mater. It is probable that other social organizations of the university will see the wisdom and far-reaching influence of this action and fall in line solidly in its support.

GOOD FEELING NO THEORY IT IS A FACT, SAY IOWANS

MONSTER GOOD TIME WILL BE STAGED FOR "AGGIES" WHEN THEY COME HERE SOON

Graduates and Former Students of Both Institutions Included in Plans for Monster Homecoming in November.

Good feeling between Iowa and Ames isn't a theory, but a fact, according to plans for a monster "good time" to be staged here in the armory under the auspices of the university of Iowa association at the second annual alumni homecoming, when Iowa plays Ames, November 15. The unique "love fest" will be held the night before the game, and there will be speakers from both the state university and the state college.

All graduates, former students, present students, and friends of the two institutions will be invited to this joint function. Already the university of Iowa association has been corresponding with Ward M. Jones, the secretary of the general alumni association of the Iowa state college, and the two organizations are working together to formulate a program of entertainment for the huge reception.

This is only one of the events which will take place during the day and a half's program which will make up the homecoming entertainment. Committees are now planning a reception for the women, contests in soccer football, and possibly a pushball contest for Saturday morning before the game. The university dramatic club is preparing for the Saturday night after the game.

Headquarters will be established here for the Ames graduates as well as for the university of Iowa graduates. The manager of the new Hotel Jefferson has promised that it will be completed in plenty of time for the event, and if so, the Ames headquarters will be in the new building.

SIGMA XI ADDRESS

The presidential address of Sigma Xi will be given by Dean C. E. Seashore in liberal arts assembly hall Wednesday, October 15, at 8 p. m. The subject will be "The measurement of individual traits." The lecture is open to the public.

Dean Seashore is a leader in a new movement in psychology which has for its object the study of individual mental traits. Naturally these studies are of interest to every one who desires a more complete understanding of his own mental life. The results of Professor Seashore's work and that of his co-workers are so important and interesting that a large audience is expected. The work is attracting much attention in this country and abroad.

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR AMES GAME

Bleachers to Be Extended to Score Board—To Seat Seven Thousand Spectators

Manager Kellogg stated yesterday

that twenty-four hundred additional seats would be put in on Iowa field to accommodate the record breaking crowd at the Ames game. On the east the bleachers will be extended to the scoreboard, raising the total number of reserved seats to four thousand two hundred. The circus seats used in the armory for basketball games will be placed north of the field for general admission. Between six and seven thousand people are expected.

Mr. Kellogg declares that every seat will be sold before the game and that all the east bleachers will be disposed of before noon on the day they are placed on sale. It is a noticeable fact that the crowd at the Ames game has been constantly on the increase in past years, and as November 15 has been selected as home coming day a record breaking crowd is expected.

Reserved seats will be placed on sale at the usual places at seven a. m. Monday, November 10.

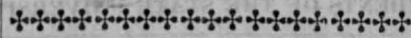

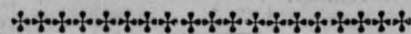
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MEMBERS OF THE JUNIOR CLASS: The above ticket is just what the name signifies; a truly independent and representative ticket.
