

Gramm's out; N.H. new hot spot

UI Phil Gramm supporters are not surprised by their candidate's decision to bow out of the presidential race.

"After he missed the farm bill by one vote and didn't take Louisiana, it was a double blow to the campaign," said UI sophomore and Gramm campaign worker Hans Gullickson. "I'm going to sit back now and reconsider the other candidates. You will not see me supporting either Forbes or Buchanan, however."

Battered by his fifth-place finish in Iowa Monday and second-place finish in Louisiana to Pat Buchanan last week, Texas Sen. Phil Gramm called top supporters around the country Tuesday night and told them he would quit the Republican presidential race, GOP sources said.

Gramm planned an afternoon announcement Wednesday in Washington.

"I knew after Louisiana that we were fighting a losing battle," said UI freshman and Gramm supporter Jeff Fisher. "I think Gramm relied on his own merit with no dirty politics and that's why his

supporters will be so disappointed that he never caught on."

Gramm's departure would leave an eight-man GOP field, with one week to go before the New Hampshire primary. It also would remove from the race a dogged conservative campaigner who early on was viewed by Sen. Bob Dole's campaign as the biggest threat to Dole's status as the GOP front-runner.

Gramm entered the race with great aplomb, boasting to a fundraiser the night before his campaign announcement that he "had the best friend in politics — ready money." Hoping to capture the spirit of the 1994 GOP congressional sweep, Gramm labeled Dole a compromiser, heralded his role in helping Ronald Reagan get his tax-cutting 1981 budget through Congress and frequently declared to audiences, "I was conservative before conservative was cool."

Gramm went on to raise more than \$20 million, but spent heavily in 1995 and his campaign never realized its promise. He was facing dim prospects in New Hampshire and beyond after being stunned by Pat Buchanan in Louisiana last week and then placing a distant fifth Monday in Iowa's caucuses. In both states, Buchanan won Christian conservative support that Gramm had been counting on to come his way.

Gramm gave no inkling of his impending decision during a luncheon speech in Concord where he


Republicans from every niche of the political spectrum are interpreting Bob Dole's slim victory in Monday's Iowa caucuses in a myriad of ways. But Democrats are confident the Republican results won't affect Bill Clinton's re-election.

Buchanan's close second-place finish sent many caucus watchers into a frenzy, except for those who support the ultra-conservative candidate. This, coupled with Steve Forbes' sudden downfall and Phil Gramm's withdrawal from the race, offers political minds everywhere plenty of fat to chew on in the week preceding

attacked Buchanan's protectionist stance on trade.

But Gramm abruptly canceled afternoon campaign events and flew back to Washington to meet with friends and advisers and assess his prospects. By early evening, he was calling top sup-

porters around the country and informing them of his plans to quit, according to three GOP sources who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity. Several top Gramm aides also were informing friends and associates, the sources said.

"When you run fifth in Iowa, an important state, you would have to be brain dead not to take a look at where you are and what you're doing," Gramm told reporters before leaving New Hampshire.

WOMEN CAN USE PRODUCT BEFORE SEX

Doctors creating HIV-killing gels for women

BETHESDA, Md. — A cousin of the healthy bacteria found in yogurt helps women fight off vaginal infections naturally — and now doctors are trying to harness these bugs to protect against the AIDS virus.

They are trying to create a gel or cream that

a woman could insert into her vagina before sexual intercourse to kill the HIV virus in case her partner had it. AIDS researchers said Tuesday the need for these "vaginal microbicides" is huge because AIDS is skyrocketing among heterosexual women worldwide.

"We are really trying to get the word out on microbicides," said Sharon Hillier of the University of Pittsburgh, who in about a month will

begin testing a candidate made with the bacteria on 900 teen-agers.

AIDS is now the fourth leading killer of U.S. women ages 25-44, and two-thirds were infected through sex.

Doctors tell women to insist their sexual partners use condoms to block HIV. But many women either don't ask or their partners refuse,

FROZEN PIZZA LOVERS

Guys: Are you average?

PHILADELPHIA — You're a guy. You spend \$46 a month at the local convenience store, have sex seven times a month (10 minutes at a time) and sleep 7 1/2 hours a night.

Congratulations. You, my friend, are average.

Citing "reports, surveys and reams of marketing data," the March issue of *Men's Health* magazine highlights, in excruciating detail, the life of the average American guy. The magazine also offers tips from experts on how to rise above the middling masses.

Few men will admit to being an average Joe, but just about all of them want to see where they stand in the grand scheme of things, said Greg Gutfield, who wrote the article.

"I think guys are always ... in some kind of competition," he said. "We're always trying to find ways to massage our egos and maybe this is just another way. You want to mark yourself against others."

"We're trying to show that maybe your perceptions aren't exactly what you think and maybe you have an edge that you didn't think you have."

So take a gander at the *Emmas*, Pa.-based magazine's numbers — varying in their scientific reliability — and start comparing yourself to the average guy, who:

- Is 5 feet, 9 inches tall and weighs 172 pounds;
- Has 70 to 80 pounds of muscle;
- Can run a mile in 12 minutes, but that's for true couch potatoes. The active average guy can do it in 7 1/2 minutes;
- Can do 33 1/2 situps in a minute;
- Loses his virginity at 17 and is married by 26;
- Lives for 72.8 years;
- Has sex with 5 to 10 partners during his lifetime;
- Spends 44 minutes a day arranging his hair and clothes;
- Watches 28 hours of television a week;
- Buys a frozen pizza four times a month;
- Drank 11 beers in the last seven days.
- Saves less than \$3,000 for retirement each year;
- Earns \$29,533 annually.
- Spent \$447.25 on jewelry last year.

Getting acquainted with the fear of strangers

You've practiced the speech a million times in your head. You have every word planned out, as well as the exact location and time. But will the object of your desire accept your offer? How long will it take to convince the one you've admired for weeks to say yes? What if the answer is no?

The anxiety of impromptu speaking, and what it does to thought processes, was the subject of a study completed by Amy Wenzel, graduate research assistant in clinical psychology, under Craig Holt, UI assistant professor of psychology and psychiatry.

"My research is looking at the way information processing is disrupted by anxiety," she said. "The simplistic definition of information processing is the sequence by

which we perceive stimuli in the environment to the way we encode it in memory to the way we retrieve it at a later time."

Holt said his research focuses on whether hypervigilance and misperceptions can be demonstrated in the lab.

"If you have a phobic disorder, you tend to be hypervigilant for presence of what they fear," Holt said.

Holt and Wenzel were awarded a grant for approximately \$7,000 by the UI department of psychiatry to compare a population of people with social phobias to those who do not experience the sweaty palms, racing heartbeat or fear of public places.

"For an individual with an anxiety disorder, attention seems to be drawn to the source of anxiety," Holt said. "If you have a phobic disorder, you tend to be hypervigilant

for presence of what you fear."

The study hypothesized that tasks measuring attention and concentration would be disrupted by performing an impromptu two-minute speech in front of a person who rated the performance.

"The subject picked the topic out of a cup and gave the speech off the top of their head," Wenzel said.

These conditions increased the level of discomfort because the awareness of the speaker is focused on themselves, rather than the attention-based or memory-based tasks that were presented immediately after the speech.

"What's been generally done in the past is symbolic representation while this study uses an actual encounter with a source of threat," Wenzel said. "We call it a construct specific activation. Cognitive fear structures are activated when they come in contact with the threat.

Anything real is going to be more potent than, symbolic threat."

The results of the experiment established that on tasks which measured both attention and retrieval from semantic memory, one's general knowledge store, socially anxious people were always worse on those tasks, Wenzel said.

One interpretation is that this could account for the reason why people with high social anxieties sometimes get the feeling they can't give a speech or carry on a conversation with strangers, Wenzel said. They freeze and feel as if they can't get into their general memory store and insert information where it is needed.

"I wanted to do this research because we wanted to merge clinical and cognitive research," Wenzel said.

Local couple assists Northwestern flood victims

Red Cross volunteers Pat and Fred Chavez, who returned two weeks ago from an assignment in West Virginia, are helping the flood-ravaged victims in the Pacific Northwest.

have been assigned to help with feeding and sheltering operations in the area.

Professor receives grant for study on maternal drug abuse

Isidore Gormezano, UI professor of psychology, has received a three-year, \$410,000 grant from the National Institutes on Drug Abuse for a study on "Maternal drug abuse: Effects upon the offspring."

Using a rabbit model, Gormezano will examine whether daily maternal cocaine dosing produces long-term deficits in learning, memory and sensory functioning in the offspring.

Gormezano also received a \$5,200 award from the College of Liberal Arts Seed Grant program to complete the construction of a fish laboratory and to conduct initial studies on associative learning, memory and neural substances in goldfish.

Congressman's book gives new meaning to family values

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Rep. Steve Gunderson says he and his companion have written a book about family values — but from their perspective as gay men.

Gunderson, interviewed Monday by the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, said "Of House and Home" will be published this summer by Dutton.

The Wisconsin Republican said he and his partner, Rob Morris, wrote "about traditional family values as lived through people who happen to be gay."

"It frankly tells our story, about two guys who come from stable, Republican families with all the traditional family values, and how we struggled with our sexual identities," he said.

"It tells of the combination of increasing prejudice and intolerance we saw in America generally, and in the Republican Party specifically, combined with an increasing number of our friends who were dying of AIDS."

Gunderson has served in the House since 1980. He said during his last campaign that he would not seek re-election this year.

Rio police stung by Jackson's reported drug payoff

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Michael Jackson has left Rio, but police are still fuming over reports that he paid a drug lord for permission to film a music video in a city slum.

Gen. Nilton Cerqueira, the Rio state security chief, said neither Jackson nor his representatives consulted his department about security measures for filming in the Dona Marta slum.

"The Jackson team could have requested our help, but they didn't," Cerqueira said Monday night. "It must be the custom in his country to give money to traffickers."

The drug kingpin of Dona Marta, known as Marcinho VP, told Brazilian reporters he had received a payoff. He also sent the video's director, Spike Lee, a T-shirt with the names of 23 alleged victims of police violence in the slum.

Lee admitted producers paid "somebody" for permission to film in Dona Marta, but said he didn't know if the person was a drug dealer.

Rio police chief Helio Luz called Lee, a "fool and a chump" for paying, but Lee disagreed.

"I think I was very smart," the filmmaker was quoted as saying in an interview Tuesday in the Rio daily Jornal do Brasil. "The police have little authority there. The producers had to negotiate with the right person."

Macy's kisses life with columnist goodbye

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Herb Caen's column returned to the front of a San Francisco

Chronicle section after nine months on a back page.

However, Caen and Macy's department store are no longer an item. The two shared a page for nearly 26 years before Macy's decided it wanted a whole page to itself.

"Yes, my outlook has improved, back on the front page of whatever section this is," Caen wrote in Monday's column in section C, classified ads.

A Macy's ad on Friday read "So Long, Herb" and showed a model in a fetching red satin chemise kissing the adjacent column.

Caen, 79, said the Macy's ad "fooled a lot of fast readers into thinking I was retiring, but no such luck, folks."

Caen has been chronicling San Francisco life for nearly 60 years.

Hospital hunk Clooney is staying single

"I tried that once, and I wasn't very good at it. So I'm not going to do it again," the "ER" star said in an interview set to air today on TV's "Extra."

"But I'm not at liberty to talk about myself and the pig and our arrangement," he joked.

Clooney married actress Talia Balsam in 1989. They divorced three years later.

State won't challenge Davenport NewsBriefs parental notification ordinance

DAVENPORT, Iowa — The Iowa Attorney General's Office will not challenge Davenport's parental notification ordinance.
The Iowa Civil Liberties Union had requested that the city's controversial abortion regulation be challenged.
In a letter last week to the ICLU, deputy attorney general Gordon Allen did not offer an opinion on the ordinance or whether a challenge would be successful.
Instead, he cited the lawsuit filed on Jan. 30 against the city by Planned Parenthood of Greater Iowa and the Emma Goldman Clin-

ic for Women, which raises many of the same concerns the ICLU has raised.
"I believe filing such a petition would unnecessarily expend our resources, duplicating efforts already begun by others," Allen said in his letter.
The city's ordinance is scheduled to take effect May 15 and was passed in anticipation that Planned Parenthood and Emma Goldman will open women's health clinics that would provide abortions in the Quad-Cities.
Opponents of the ordinance say it infringes on a minor's right to access and that the city over-

stepped its authority by trying to regulate abortion.
The measure requires that the parents of minors seeking abortions be notified 48 hours in advance of the abortion.
The attorney general's letter follows a similar rejection by Scott County Attorney Bill Davis, who also was asked by the ICLU to challenge the ordinance.
ICLU legal director Randall Wilson said Monday he was not surprised by the attorney general's response and said the organization's legal committee would meet to consider what to do next.

Council approves temporary Madison Street closure

Madison Street will be closed in three phases from March 1 to June 1 between Jefferson and College streets in order to allow the construction of the UI's chilled water distribution lines.
The Iowa City City Council passed a resolution Tuesday night allowing the closure in order to insure the safety of pedestrians, workers and vehicles near the construction site.
In the same area, Iowa City is building a water main, which will be funded by the City of Iowa City water distribution budget.
City staff said construction cannot wait until after May, when there will be less student traffic in

the area. The chilled water line construction is necessary to improve air conditioning in the UI Main Library for the protection of rare book collections from the summer humidity.

Third trimester death bill approved by committee

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Officials would be able to prosecute those who caused a pregnant woman in her third trimester to lose the baby, under a bill approved Tuesday by a House committee.
The bill was requested by Doug and Jean Fisher of Iowa City and Dave and Lauri Whiskeyman of Davenport. Both couples lost their unborn children in car accidents.

The Fishers have given up their full-time jobs so they can push for legislation to punish those who end a woman's pregnancy or cause serious injury to the fetus. They were at the Statehouse Tuesday to meet with legislators about their proposal, which would apply only to pregnancies in the seventh month and later.
In December 1994, the Fishers were driving in Iowa City when they were hit head-on by a teenager eluding police in a stolen vehicle. Jean, who was seven months pregnant, lost the baby.
The bill approved by the House Judiciary Committee would make it a crime to end a pregnancy or seriously injure a late-term fetus under several circumstances.

Average American worker manages to stay just above rising inflation rate

WASHINGTON — The wages and benefits paid American workers rose just 2.9 percent last year, the smallest increase on record and fresh fuel for the unhappiness of a middle class convinced it is falling behind.

The biggest factor was restraint in health care and other benefits, though they were rising more quick-

ly as the year ended.

The Labor Department said Tuesday the increase in its Employment Cost Index was down from 3 percent in 1994 and the smallest since the government began recording annual changes in 1982.

The gain barely kept worker compensation ahead of inflation. The Consumer Price Index rose 2.5 percent last year.

Businesses concerned about maintaining profits are keeping

employee costs under close control and "basically labor is not in a position to argue," said Robert G. Dederick, economic consultant for the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

Overall job growth has been slow, and many companies have been downsizing, giving workers little leverage to seek increased wages and benefits.

"This tells the American worker that he's not sharing in the nation's productivity growth," said John

Zalusky, an economist with the AFL-CIO. "He's barely keeping up with cost of living."

The reason, he contended, is that "this nation has chosen a low road to international competition. It's chosen to compete by low wages, laying workers off, not investing in education, not investing in the work force, not investing in technology."

At the White House, press secretary Mike McCurry said President Clinton "has been deeply concerned

about our ability to grow this economy in a way that produces higher incomes for American workers."

"Wage stagnation," McCurry said, would be one of the major problems that will occupy Clinton's time "throughout this year and well into the second term."

In economic terms, the employment-cost index is considered one of the best gauges of inflation since compensation represents about two-thirds of the cost of a product.

Wages and salaries — nearly three-fourths of total compensation — rose 2.9 percent last year, little changed from 2.8 percent growth in 1994.

The cost of benefits, such as health care and pensions, grew 2.8 percent, the smallest gain since the series began in 1982. Benefit costs had risen 3.4 percent in 1994.

Although worker compensation did beat the inflation rate last year, real earnings have been stagnant.

the New Hampshire primaries.

UI political science professor Joel Barkan said Buchanan's finish wasn't the most surprising thing regarding the caucuses. Barkan cited low voter turnout as the biggest shock for him.

"The results don't reflect the views of all Republicans," Barkan said. "They do reflect the views of those going to the polls. Buchanan has been very good at turning out voters."

"I think the number of voters turning out was the biggest surprise. People's general dissatisfaction with the candidates and with the negative campaigning may have been a reason."

Even though voter turnout wasn't as encouraging as it could have been statewide, voter turnout in Iowa City was remarkable, said Allison Miller, a UI sophomore and Clinton campaign worker.

Miller said Republicans who are antsy to knock the president out of the White House aren't going about it the right way.

"I honestly don't think Buchanan's finish, or any of the other results will effect the Clinton campaign at all," Miller said. "All the separatist tactics in the Republican Party right now are turning a lot of Republicans off, especially the younger ones."

While many are confused about the Buchanan finish, supporters and campaign workers are salivating over the possibilities in New Hampshire and the general presidential election.

Loras Schulte, state director of Buchanan's Iowa campaign, said Monday's results send a clear message to the nation.

"I think we were the clear winners in the race," Schulte said. "It makes it clear that Pat's message and vision are getting through. There's a well-spring of support out there for him."

"This has got to give us a major bump for the race in New Hampshire. It's just the boost we need not only to do well there, but to win it," he added.


"We had an incredible turn out (Monday) night. It encouraged me a lot. It rebuilt my faith in the supposed apathy of college students."

Miller said she was told that the last caucuses in 1992 yielded only two participants in her precinct. Monday night she said there were at least 35 people there.

"It was very impressive," she said.

Another hot topic of discussion was the strength of Lamar Alexander's third-place finish. By grabbing 18 percent of the Republican votes — just 8 points off the pace set by Dole — Alexander surprised most everyone, except for those who believe in his message.

A major factor in Alexander's strong showing, UI sophomore Amanda Kunz said, is the character of her candidate.

Accusations of mudslinging, defamation spark suit

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — A failed Senate candidate is suing her opponent for using words like "guilty" and "convicted" when talking about her in the closing days of the race.

Not only did the loaded language cost Ruthann Aron the election, but "her life as she knew it was taken away" because she was defamed by Bill Brock, attorney Geoffrey Gitner told a civil court jury as the lawsuit went to trial Tuesday.

He said Brock's comments and commercials dealing with civil

suits filed against Aron by associates in a real estate deal were deliberately crafted to make it appear she was a convicted criminal.

Brock, a former Tennessee senator and national Republican chairperson, said during a break in the trial, "I don't think anything I said was out of line." He won the 1994 GOP primary against Aron, but lost in the general election to Democratic incumbent Sen. Paul Sarbanes.

The lawsuit, which seeks unspecified damages, is a test of how far political candidates can go in criticizing opponents before they cross

the line into slander and libel. Lawyers involved in the case say a ruling in Aron's favor could change the face of political campaigns, but a legal expert disagreed.

"I just don't think in the end people will look at it and say, 'My God, candidates better walk carefully in the future,'" said Larry Sabato, a political analyst at the University of Virginia and co-author of an upcoming book on campaign practices.

Even in this era of negative campaigning, lawsuits over claims made during political campaigns are a rarity, Sabato said.

But Joyce Terhes, chairwoman of

the Maryland Republican Party, is worried about the impact, at least in Maryland.

If Aron wins, "people are always going to be looking over their shoulder afraid of what's going to happen," she said. "It would be more difficult to recruit people to run for office."

The dispute centers on Brock advertisements and a news conference that Brock held a week before the 1994 primary, a time when a poll showed him and Aron in a statistical tie with a large undecided vote.

Brock ran about 1,000 television and radio ad spots dealing with the

\$300,000 Aron, a developer, paid to settle lawsuits brought by partners in two real estate deals.

Juries ruled against her in two of the suits, but both were settled outside court, one while the judgment was on appeal and the other after a judge threw out the jury award.

Brock's lawyer, Ben Cotten, told jurors the advertisements were not libelous because they used phrases such as "out of bounds," "wrongdoing" and "trouble obeying the law," which are not associated only with criminal actions.

At the news conference before the primary, Brock used words

such as "found guilty," "fines" and "convicted by a jury."

Cotten said those words were uttered innocently in the heat of the moment as the two candidates held side-by-side news conferences outside a county courthouse.

Jeffrey Goldfarb, a sociologist at the New School for Social Research in New York, said Aron's chances of winning may be better because a jury is hearing the case.

"Ordinary people know they don't want themselves to be lied about," Goldfarb said. "People don't know there's a long tradition of lying in politics."

ALMOST BROKE

Buchanan, Alexander ahead in race, last in cash

WASHINGTON — Lamar Alexander worked the telephones Tuesday for more donations — a stark reminder that his strong showing in Iowa, like Pat Buchanan's, will be short-lived without an infusion of cold, hard cash.

The surprising 2-3 finish of Buchanan and Alexander in Iowa's caucuses Monday night was the product of months of inexpensive, door-to-door campaigning. But that luxury quickly disappears in the flurry of primaries that follow.

Reaching voters after next week's New Hampshire primary will take lots of money — something Buchanan and Alexander had little enough of even before Iowa.

Alexander, who ended 1995 with \$600,000 to spend, told 250 supporters in a telephone conference Tuesday he needs each of them to raise \$5,000 by Friday.

"In the past, you could capitalize on a good (Iowa) showing by spending a few weeks raising money," said Steve Salmore, a Rutgers University professor who studies the impact of money on politics. "They can't do that now. The problem is that we're moving from the retail states of Iowa and New Hampshire into the wholesale states of Florida and California."

To make matters worse, two of their rivals have plenty of money to spend — Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole finished 1995 with \$4.3 million in the bank, and multimillionaire publisher Steve Forbes is determined to forge on with his relentless advertising campaign despite a fourth-place finish in Iowa.

Next stop, New Hampshire — the one that counts

CONCORD, N.H. — Round Two in the 1996 presidential nominating bout began with a roar of chest-thumping today in New Hampshire, where for over four decades voters have had an 11-1 record of anointing the next president.

"In the end it's going to be a contest between Bob Dole and me," Lamar Alexander said today, and Pat Buchanan made the same claim almost in the same words. He said: "We astonished Dole in Iowa."

Texas Sen. Phil Gramm, who finished a dismal fifth in Iowa, made one campaign stop in New Hampshire before canceling the rest of his events to return to Washington to consult with his top advisers about his future.

Asked by a reporter if he's considering withdrawing, Gramm said, "We are going to have to look at where we are."

Jim Courtevich, Gramm's New Hampshire campaign manager,

said Gramm would make an announcement on Wednesday, probably in Washington.

Earlier in the day, Gramm aides had said his campaign was thinking of diverting precious resources away from New Hampshire and towards southern and western states where the Texas senator expects to do better.

Commentator Buchanan, whose New Hampshire showing four years ago pointed up then-President Bush's vulnerability, hoped to repeat that performance against nominal front-runner Dole in next Tuesday's primary vote.

Dole seemed unfazed that his rivals were nipping at his heels.

"We're going to win," Dole said today after delivering a presidential-sounding address to the New Hampshire Legislature.

Asked if he sees himself in the lead, he gave a simple, "yep," then flashed a thumbs up sign.

Buchanan finished a strong second in Iowa's caucuses, just 3 percentage points behind Dole. He said that showing — along with victories in an Alaska straw poll

and Louisiana's contest last week with Gramm — established him "as the one conservative who can win this nomination."

He dismissed millionaire publisher Steve Forbes, who finished a weak fourth, as a flash in the pan: "I just do not believe that soufflé will rise a second time."

Forbes begged to differ. "Iowa was a huge hurdle for us," he said. "We got over it, and now we're sprinting to New Hampshire."

Later, without explanation, Forbes canceled his only scheduled appearance today, a speech to the Rotary Club in Wolfeboro, N.H.

Alexander, buoyed by his third-place showing in Iowa, had intended to take a pre-dawn walk through Manchester — reminiscent of his trek through the state last summer — but changed his mind when he saw how cold it was: close to zero degrees.

"I think the first test of presidential leadership is having the good sense not to go out and walk this morning," Alexander told junior-high and high-school students who had planned to walk with him.

He also claimed to benefit in Iowa from a positive campaign. But that advantage could be lost in New Hampshire, where Alexander is airing ads deriding Forbes as "that zillionaire mudslinger" and Gramm as "that grumpy Texan."

Dole, who won Iowa in 1988 only to watch his candidacy derail a week later in New Hampshire, was laconic as he headed here. "One down, one to go," he said.

Dole, the Senate majority leader, planned to kick off his New Hampshire home stretch with a speech before the state legislature.

"There's no complacency... We'll continue our message war and make sure the ground troops are ready with signs, phone banks and rides to the polls next week," said New Hampshire Rep. Bill Zeff, a key Dole organizer.

New Hampshire's Feb. 20 ballot-

ing launches a rapid-fire string of primaries in 30 states, which are likely to decide the GOP nominee by the time votes are counted from the March 26 California primary.

And, while New Hampshire has just 16 delegates up for grabs — less than 1 percent of the total needed to clinch the nomination — it has historically been a make-or-break contest for presidential contenders. Ever since the birth of the modern primary in 1952, only Bill Clinton lost New Hampshire and went on to win the White House.

But any number of wild cards could topple the clearly defined Top Three coming out of Iowa, starting with independent voters who form a majority and are allowed to vote in the GOP primary.

Also, the Christian conservatives who helped Buchanan in Iowa are

not as potent a force in New Hampshire, and some analysts even predict a backlash from the state's more fiscally orientated conservatives.

"Suddenly Buchanan is a threat. Socially moderate Republicans are going to be concerned about finding a candidate who can beat Pat Buchanan," said pollster Dick Bennett of Manchester's American Research Group.

Then there's Forbes, the flat-tax, anti-establishment multimillionaire. Going into the Iowa caucuses, he was neck-and-neck with Dole in New Hampshire polls.

Forbes insisted his distant fourth in Iowa was "a good springboard into New Hampshire" and he would keep up his drumbeat "to kill the tax code" — a message that resonates in a state with no sales or income tax.

At least one recent Forbes convert, Guy Hastings of Manchester, said he was sticking with Forbes no matter what the Iowa result.

"I think he's shaken up the rest of them and I'm grateful for that," Hastings said.

Caucuses' end takes spotlight off Iowa

DES MOINES, Iowa — No offense, but the hottest commodity in Iowa Tuesday was a one-way ticket out of state.

At the Des Moines Airport, it was standing-room only for the "TransCaucus Express," an airliner chartered by the Iowa Republican Party to ferry reporters to New Hampshire, next up on the campaign calendar.

"There were a lot of nervous people standing around waiting to see if there would be any cancellations," said Iowa Republican Chairman Brian Kennedy.

The flight was jammed with reporters and television technicians, though a few clever campaign staffers found their way aboard.

"They were figuring they'd have a captive audience for a couple of hours for spin," Kennedy said.

On the day after Iowa's Republican presidential caucuses — and with the New Hampshire primary just a week away — no one was canceling tickets heading out of Iowa.

Throughout Des Moines, technicians were dismantling makeshift television studios and

rental cars were suddenly available. Barricaded downtown streets were slowly opening as satellite trucks moved out.

But the surest sign of the passing political season was on the airwaves. TV stations suddenly were airing commercials promoting hardware stores, not tax plans.

Television networks had set up shop at the ornate old Statehouse, with its eye-pleasing architecture.

On Tuesday morning, huge metal equipment boxes were stacked in the Rotunda as crews did their dismantling work.

The Legislature was back at work, though political activists conceded their hearts weren't in it.

Jeff Mitchell, an assistant to House Speaker Ron Corbett, was feeling blue, after working for

mer Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander since 1993.

"I've been working, organizing things for two full years," he said. "You worked for four years and then one day there's this flash of light and it's over."

"We were the spotlight and now that's gone," moaned Mitchell. "I kind of liked being the spotlight."

At campaign offices, answering machines were the order of the day.

"Due to tremendous interest in Lamar, all of our lines are busy," Alexander aide Bryan Flood intoned in a recorded message. A bit odd, since the campaign office was empty and locked.

At Bob Dole's office, Iowa campaign manager Darrell Kearney was on duty — planning his vacation to Florida.

"I'm just going to go down and lay on the beach and read a book and try to come down," he said. After that, Kearney was headed back to his real job — working for a debt collection service.

Serbs denounce transfer of suspects

SARAJEVO, Bosnia — A Serb leader warned Tuesday that NATO and the Bosnian government risked a dangerous backlash by sending two Bosnian Serbs off to a war crimes court. A worried NATO shut its liaison office in the Bosnian Serb stronghold of Pale.

Peace efforts stumbled further Tuesday as German diplomats failed to resolve sharp Muslim-Croat differences over the divided city of Mostar.

The two Serb officers, Gen. Djordje Djukic and Col. Aleksa Krsmanovic, were taken from a Sarajevo jail Monday and flown in an American NATO plane to the Netherlands for further investigation into war

crimes charges first raised by the Bosnian government.

Zoran Lilic, president of Serb-led Yugoslavia, denounced the extradition Tuesday, saying it would make Bosnian Serbs distrust both the war crimes tribunal in The Hague and the NATO-led troops trying to enforce peace in Bosnia. Other Bosnian Serb leaders called the transfer illegal.

"We are only one step from some more dangerous reaction or incident," Lilic was quoted as saying by Yugoslavia's Tanjug news agency.

Fearing possible retaliation, the NATO-led force shut down its liaison office in Pale.

"We are taking no chances, just precautions," said spokesperson Lt. Col. Charles-Henri de Noirmont,

who would not say how many troops were involved.

It was all part of the worsening ties between NATO troops and the Serbs, who broke off relations after government police arrested the two Serb officers Jan. 30.

NATO spokesperson Col. John Kirkwood could not name a single instance Tuesday of recent contact between senior Serb authorities and NATO officials. Bosnian Serbs were also absent from a Vienna meeting mediated on reducing arms of the former warring factions.

The two Serb officers have not been indicted. Tribunal spokesperson Christian Chartier said Tuesday a decision on whether or not to charge them with war crimes will be made "within weeks."

Still, they were being held Tuesday in the high security Scheveningen prison with Dusan Tadic, a Bosnian Serb scheduled to face trial on murder, torture and rape charges.

"This is a dangerous precedent," said Velibor Ostojic, a senior figure in the Bosnian Serb hierarchy. "All this gravely jeopardizes further implementation of the peace agreement."

Lilic also functions as a mouthpiece for Serbian leader Slobodan Milosevic, the main power broker in the region, whose support is essential to put the Dayton peace plan into effect. All peace efforts could collapse if Milosevic decided to reject the peace deal and return his support to the Bosnian Serbs.

Bombing marks recent return of old IRA tactics

CLOGHER, Northern Ireland — The IRA's return to violence after 17 months made no sense to most people in Northern Ireland. But IRA supporters in Clogher and other border towns feel better now that the bomb is back.

They thought their Sinn Fein party was getting short shrift in peace talks. Now, they think their cause will be taken more seriously after a bombing Friday in London.

"All that devastation — it's great. About time," said Chris Keenan, 23. "I was surprised when it happened all right, but then I was quietly pleased. It just goes to show you what the IRA can do."

Keenan said he had worked on the construction of the office towers that were damaged in the bombing, which killed two people, wounded more than 40 and caused an estimated \$125 million in damage.

"When you heard later that two bodies had been found, well that took some of the shine off it," he said. "But still, bombing London's a good tactic, maybe the best tactic we've got right now."

Along the border which divides the British-ruled province from the rest of Ireland, many supporters of the Irish Republican Army and Sinn Fein believe that IRA bombings in London's financial district in 1992 and 1993 pushed Britain to a truce-for-talks offer to Sinn Fein.

This time, the bombing has brought back some of the security measures that had been abandoned after the IRA and pro-British "loyalist" groups stopped their killing campaigns in 1994.

In South Armagh, a mostly Catholic border region of intense IRA loyalties east of Clogher, soldiers are again providing heavily armed "cover" to police checking IDs and searching vehicles for bombs.

IRA supporters in turn have posted signs, complete with misspellings, that warn: "Buisness as usual — IRA" and "The British Want A Millitary Solution — They'll Get One."

IRA supporters still blame Britain for Sinn Fein's exclusion from multiparty negotiations with pro-British "unionists."

When President Clinton came to Northern Ireland last year and told the gunmen, "your day is over," many of them disagreed.

Sinn Fein and IRA supporters were pleased when, within months of the cease-fire, British soldiers were pulled back from active duty and more than 100 cross-border roads were reopened. But they also want amnesty for all IRA prisoners, a full British withdrawal and the unification of Ireland — all unlikely developments even if negotiations do get under way.

And peace has brought new frustrations. In South Armagh, known as "bandit country" for its IRA-supported lawlessness, police felt safe

to enforce court summonses for unpaid taxes and TV licenses.

"For me, peace meant getting a ticket for speeding. That was my peace dividend!" said farmer Jim Kelly, a Sinn Fein supporter.

For more than a year, Sinn Fein leader Gerry Adams warned that the cease-fire would break down if talks didn't start. Some of his supporters said the bombing was the only way to drive the point home.

"Gerry told everyone who'd listen, but (British Prime Minister John) Major wouldn't even meet him," said an IRA member, who as such would face arrest if identified. "That bomb's as good a wakeup call as Major's likely to get. He's got to adjust his attitude."

Britain insists that getting unionist leaders to the same table as IRA supporters was difficult enough during the cease-fire — and now seems impossible. Republicans see it the other way around.

"For the past year and a half they said they wouldn't talk to us because we wouldn't give up the guns," said Raymond McMahon, the main Sinn Fein figure in Clogher, which is about 50-50 Protestant-Catholic. "Unionists obviously don't want to talk, and have to be made to talk."



"One of the things that we're going to try to do this afternoon and tonight is to take a look at where we are."

The sources said Gramm looked at three options: quit, retreat from New Hampshire to concentrate on a few Southern states, or retreat and make one last-ditch effort in South Carolina, which holds the first Southern primary on March 2.

"He went through the finances and the organization and just decided it wasn't there," said one of the sources.

Speaking to reporters earlier in the day, Dole was sympathetic toward the plight of his rival, having struggled in two previous White House runs himself.

"I went through that before and, you know, Phil is a very able person," Dole said. "He will make the right judgment, whatever he thinks he should do."

Gramm, 52, would be the third candidate to quit the race. California Gov. Pete Wilson had a short-lived campaign, and Pennsylvania Sen. Arlen Specter quit late last year after his effort to rally party moderates who support abortion rights

failed to generate much financial or organizational support. Wilson and Specter now support Dole.

Gramm, who also faces re-election to his Texas Senate seat this year, had no immediate plans to endorse a presidential candidate, two of the sources said. His departure, though, is likely to bring Dole some additional support from GOP Senate colleagues who were backing Gramm.

Gramm's Senate supporters include Sens. John McCain of Arizona, Kay Bailey Hutchison of Texas, Paul Coverdell of Georgia and Bob Smith of New Hampshire.

Iowa City resident Lisa Marco ventured out Monday to buy cards for her parents, husband and grandmother. She doesn't think about what kind of cards she's going to buy until she gets there.

"Usually, I like humor cards," she said. "It has to be how it strikes me."

Marco said she refuses to buy the frilly ones, though.

"I would like more humorous ones. I have trouble finding cards for my grandma that are funny," Marco said.

UI sophomore Chad Thurn, said he doesn't even look at the frilly cards.

"If it says 'Oh my love,' I don't even bother," he said.

or they sometimes use the condoms wrong.

A cheap, easy-to-use microbicide would give women more control to protect themselves, explained Zeda Rosenberg of the National Institutes of Health, which is spending about \$12 million on microbicide research.

Within two years, NIH hopes to know if a spermicide ingredient already sold to help diaphragms and other birth-control devices work also fights HIV. This ingredient, nonoxonyl-9, kills HIV in the test tube but some studies suggest it actually increases women's risk because it irritates the vagina, creating footholds for HIV infection. NIH now is funding a study of prostitutes in Cameroon and Kenya, where female HIV infection is epidemic, to settle the question.

Hillier told AIDS researchers she is trying to create a natural microbicide made from the beneficial bacteria already in the bodies of

healthy women.

Lactobacilli are best known as bacteria eaten in yogurt, but a very different strain lives in the vagina. They're essentially little machines that constantly manufacture hydrogen peroxide and lactic acid, two chemicals that kill infections, including HIV, Hillier explained.

Not all women have these lactobacilli, often because the bacteria is washed out by douching. Hillier studied 600 women in a Seattle clinic and found women most likely to have the disease-fighting bacteria were white nonsmokers over age 19 who seldom douche. The 275 women who did have the good bacteria were much less likely to have any vaginal infections.

Now Hillier is putting the organisms into vaginal suppositories to see if they will take root and help women naturally fend off infections, including HIV.

In about a month, she will give the suppositories or a placebo to 900 Pennsylvania teen-agers,

checking them for sexually transmitted infections for at least three years.

"It's extremely promising" research, said Dr. Sten Vermund of the University of Alabama.

British scientists have another approach to microbicides: creating a gel thick enough to coat vaginal cells so HIV can't take hold. Researchers at St. Mary's Hospital in London are about to test how well it works in people.

But creating microbicides is an uphill battle because the pharmaceutical industry isn't interested, the NIH's Rosenberg said Tuesday. Companies foresee little profit in microbicides because they will have to be cheap even here to gain women's interest, and sold at or below cost in poor, developing countries, she said.

"We're all very frustrated because we need a microbicide today," agreed Hillier.

Survey: Teachers value computers, basic skills over classics

WASHINGTON — Computer literacy, citizenship and basic skills are more important than learning Shakespeare or Hemingway, a survey of public school teachers says.

Less than 25 percent of 1,164 teachers listed classic works from Shakespeare and Plato, or writings by American authors, such as Ernest Hemingway or John Steinbeck, as "absolutely essential."

Instead, at least 70 percent of the teachers ranked the three R's, the value of hard work, citizenship, computer skills and U.S. history and geography as essential components of public school curriculum.

"They don't think Shakespeare is the be-all, end-all for kids," said Steve Farkas, who worked on the

survey released Tuesday by Public Agenda, a research group founded by pollster Daniel Yankelovich and former Secretary of State Cyrus Vance. "Computer skills emerge from the pack because the teachers connect that with survival in the real world."

Among the survey's other findings:

- Of factors that might determine career success, teachers place "an excellent academic education" a distant third, with only 21 percent saying it is the most important factor. Persistence and inner drive, and knowing how to deal well with people rank first and second.

- Some 27 percent of the teachers think "A" students are "much more likely" to get good jobs, while 46 percent say they are "somewhat more likely" to do so.

The survey also showed that teachers support higher standards for students, but raising them is not their most urgent goal. They are more concerned about pressures from social problems, lack of funding, overcrowded classrooms and a lack of parental involvement, the survey showed.

"If we valued the classics and history and advanced math and science, and gave kids those concepts so that they would be thinking and knowledgeable, they could learn about computers later," said Delores Obermiller, dean of instruction at King High School in Corpus Christi, Texas.

The findings of the teacher sur-

vey mirrored another Public Agenda survey of the general public's attitudes about education.

Chester Finn, a former Education Department official in the Reagan administration and a Hudson Institute research fellow, said he was not surprised that only a quarter of the general public ranked the classics or American literary works as "absolutely essential." But he was disappointed that teachers didn't rank them higher.

"I think teachers have been brainwashed by the political-correctness crowd to think that anything associated with 'classics' is tainted as 'dead, white, European male' imperialism," Finn said.

Keith Geiger, president of the National Education Association, the nation's largest teacher union, said he was glad to see that the teachers and general public both put basic reading, writing and math skills at the top of the list of "absolutely essential" curriculum items.

Ranking computers over classics reflects teachers' pragmatism, he said.

"I think teachers believe they have a lot more students in their classrooms who will have jobs that require dealing with computers than with reading the classics," Geiger said. "We have to prepare these kids to get jobs."

Judge rules tethering to parents dangerous to arrested girl

MONCKS CORNER, S.C. (AP) — A 15-year-old girl who spent two months tethered to her parents was sent directly from a courtroom Tuesday into state custody. A judge said her home was no place for her to be.

Tonya Kline's lawyer had argued that being tethered to her mother or father was punishment in itself. The teen-ager, who was charged with truancy, shoplifting, burglary and grand larceny, also apologized to the judge.

"I deeply regret everything I've done and if there is anything," she said, sobbing. "If there is anything I can do to repay then I am more than willing to do so."

The judge was unmoved. "A return to your home right now without adequate structure and supervision is an invitation to disaster," said Family Court Judge Wayne Creech, who sentenced her to state custody for an undetermined period.

In December, Creech said Kline, who had been in custody, could go home pending sentencing but only if she were tethered 24 hours a day to her mother, Deborah Harter, including while Kline was at school.

Harter was hospitalized last month after a drug overdose and Kline's stepfather, Richard Harter, then assumed the tether. But last weekend he returned to his Navy job and the family helped pay for others to hold the tether until the court appearance.

CompuServe allows users to decide whether to receive sex newsgroups

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Reversing course, CompuServe is allowing its subscribers to reach all but five of some 200 sex-oriented portions of the Internet it had declared off-limits under pressure from German prosecutors.

But the on line service has also given parents the ability to block offensive material for free, adopting a practice already used by America Online and Prodigy.

"The idea is to put control in the hands of the user. We think that's something the industry can get behind," CompuServe spokesperson Jeff Shafer said Tuesday in announcing that it is restoring access to most sex-oriented "newsgroups."

The five newsgroups that are still beyond the reach of CompuServe's 4.3 million subscribers contain child pornography, Shafer said. The more than 200 reinstated newsgroups include topics such as bestiality and fetishes.

The Internet allows people around the world to post and exchange text and pictures on thousands of electronic discussion forums called newsgroups. These can often be reached via a local phone call to an on-line service.

Marshals empty registers at Kmart due to company's unpaid bond

MIAMI (AP) — When Kmart Corp. failed to pay up immediately on a \$2 million court order, U.S. marshals declared their own blue-light special at two stores.

About six agents dressed in raid jackets emptied the cash registers of \$45,000 Monday night at stores in Hollywood and Davie. A court clerk gave the go-ahead for attorneys to collect the money after Kmart failed to post the required bond in an age-discrimination lawsuit.

Jesse James held up a train and counts his money in the woods. These guys counted it on the counter in the front of everybody," said Louis Eso, who was shopping with his wife at the Kmart in Hollywood when it was raided.

Company officials were outraged.

"I would have to think our federal marshals would have other activities they could be attending to rather than this charade," said Shawn Kahle, a spokesperson for the Troy, Mich.-based department store chain.

It takes money

■ The profits may go to charity, but the bottom line is the first lady is spending tax-payers' dollars as she travels the country promoting her new book.

America's first lady is first on *The New York Times* bestseller list — and she's using tax money to promote her successful book. Hillary Rodham Clinton will go on tour this month to endorse "It Takes A Village and Other Lessons Children Teach Us," a thoughtful advice-ridden book published by Simon and Schuster.

Since she's so high-profile, she's using a 12-seat jet, at a minimal \$2,890 per flying hour. The Secret Service encouraged the use of such a costly vehicle for security reasons.

The New York-based publisher will reimburse the government for the amount of a first-class air ticket for each leg of the trip for Rodham Clinton and the two aides traveling with her, an estimated \$11,958 to \$16,164.

The total amount will come to an estimated \$69,360 and taxpayers will shell out between \$53,196 (77 percent) and \$57,402 (82 percent) of the airfare bill.

Secret Service protection will cost extra.

And this scenario isn't new.

When former first lady Barbara Bush wrote a book about her dog, Millie, she used a military jet, at taxpayer's expense, to promote it. The book became a bestseller.

Rodham Clinton's is too, but she should be commended for giving the proceeds to children's charities.

But nearly \$3,000 per hour for a private plane could be lessened considerably. The extravagant gesture of giving away the book's earnings to charity becomes much less meaningful when looking at the amount of money Rodham Clinton is using to promote it.

There is no question that bodyguard protection is needed. Yet, the cost of travel doesn't need to be so high. Simon and Schuster will pay the cost of first-class airfare. But as first lady, Rodham Clinton is in more danger than the average author. She obviously has more money than the average author, too, but for some odd reason, she can't pay for transportation herself.

The White House reports it to be an unfortunate but necessary cost. But this country's tax funds are not private coffers for government officials. Rodham Clinton's book is a private undertaking. Her personal endeavor has little to do with her position as first lady, other than the wonderful marketing opportunity.

The book is selling and will continue to do well on the market. The subject matter is touching, if not powerful. However, the content has little to do with the book's success: fame sells more than literary quality, as recent books by Bill Gates, Newt Gingrich and Colin Powell have shown.

And so she will make a bundle of money, which she will reportedly give promptly away. She will also be costing taxpayers a bundle of money. The numbers just don't balance out, even if the money will be used in a beneficial manner.

The reasons given for the expense don't justify the sum of the airfare. Rodham Clinton may have good intentions, but a more careful financial analysis should have prevailed over the good ambitions of the nation's first lady.

Training program prepares teachers

It offers intensive orientations before classes begin, ongoing weekly meetings with tenured faculty and peers, close faculty mentoring and overall supervision by the director of the program.

The program also gives experienced graduate instructors the opportunity to become program associates who help organize and administer teacher training sessions, act as liaisons between the director and instructors and provide peer support to instructors throughout the year. Having worked closely with the associates this year, I can attest to their commitment to teaching as an extension of their scholarship and as a profession to which they bring enormous energy, talent and concern for the education of undergraduate students. The high percentage of very positive evaluations given new instructors by their students and faculty advisers attests to our success in preparing them to teach.

The assumption that faculty members are automatically better teachers is a flawed one. We may have more experience and more research publications and we may be gifted teachers, but many of us entered the classroom with little to no education in the philosophies and techniques of pedagogy and without the attention to our classroom practices that the General Education in Literature Program offers its graduate instructors. I urge UI students and faculty to respect the hard work of these well-prepared and often talented and dedicated teachers.

Unfortunately, the cloth was so long that it almost caught fire as I turned on the stove to make the rice. I caught it just in time. Good thing I am not clumsy.

The guests arrived. I tried to act nonchalant, greeting them while trying to conceal a long kitchen dishtowel wrapped in and hanging from my fingers. They asked about it; I shrugged it off.

With the main course over, one of my guests, a doctor, insisted on seeing the wound. He started asking all those technical questions doctors ask like, "Did you clean it?" Clean? How do you clean an open gushing wound? Water makes stuff bleed worse, doesn't it?

"But you really should rinse it," he advised. I turned on the kitchen faucet and held it under. I yelped pathetically. It hurt! "Don't use hot water," he told me. I hadn't. But it still hurt.

He wanted to take me to the hospital for stitches. "It's pretty deep," he diagnosed. I refused. We hadn't even had dessert yet. He offered to go to the drug store and get some first aid stuff. Before I could stop him, he was out the door. I am sure I was making a fantastic impression on this new friend.

He told me to "baby" it for a few days. When I went to get off the examination table, I slipped. The nurse caught me in mid-fall. "Careful," she advised me.

I stepped cautiously into the winter air, holding my wrapped hand with my good one and balancing my bag in the crook of my elbow. "Look out world," I thought.

And then I went off to teach my aerobics class.

Forty-three men and women, sitting in tiny plastic chairs in a semi-circle in Mrs. Jackson's 5th/6th grade class on the second floor of Longfellow Elementary School Monday night may have had a pretty good bead on who will win the Republican presidential nomination.

Throw out a couple of votes for "correctional error" (like burying Alexander in the basement), and what you come up with is an expected victory for Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, a potent showing for conservative commentator Buchanan and toss-up between Forbes and Gramm for the front row at Political Rehabilitation School.

The straw vote in Mrs. Jackson's class reflects to a remarkable degree Dole's solid yet quiet Heartland support, as well as the awesome strength the Iowa caucuses have in molding U.S. politics. Look at what happened at the 17th Precinct Monday night, one of 2,142 precinct sites across the state.

The merits of each candidate were discussed for five minutes, and

when Dole's name came up, there was a pause of silence, only to be broken by a white-haired World War II veteran who announced that his first vote for president was for Alf Landon in 1936, and that today, he said, "I'd like to think someone else from Kansas could be president." Clinton, he said, "was a draft dodger and a traitor to our country. Our biggest job is to get rid of the man in the White House and her royal highness, Hillary Rodham Clinton."

To which there was a round of applause and hearty chuckles. But that was mostly it for Dole in Mrs. Jackson's classroom. Buchanan, Forbes, Gramm, Alexander and even Keyes all generated impassioned, rousing speeches — but look at the vote.

Precinct secretary Sue Lynch summed up Republican sentiment best when she said, "A bad Republican beats a good Democrat any day!" More applause and chuckles. In fact, the whole caucus reminded me of a very pleasant group therapy session — no recriminations, no yelling, no showmanship a clean and collective expiration of Heartland psyche.

It got so downright pleasant that I stepped out to take in the Democratic caucus, going on down the hall to Longfellow's library, where something of an entirely different nature was happening. It was getting loud and a bit obnoxious with a couple of put-downs coming from several smug know-it-alls on the fringes. The 75 Democrats were mired in a complicated resolution about the nature of science and environmental protection. There were three substitute motions but frankly, it seemed a little too complicated for a party with just one candidate, so I ducked out into the nippy night.

So, what actually happened Monday night in Mrs. Jackson's class? From my vantage point, it was as close to grassroots politicking as you come in America. The straw vote, of course, ultimately has no bearing on the candidate affiliation of Iowa's 25 delegates to the GOP convention in San Diego. The straw vote, though, had a far greater significance. It knocked out of the Republican race a millionaire media mogul and a potent Texas senator; it reinvigorated the campaigns of a strident political commentator and a former Tennessee governor with a penchant for plaid shirts — all by fewer than 100,000 people circling names on a pink scrap of paper in classrooms, living rooms and auditoriums across Iowa's 99 counties. That's an amazing amount of raw political power.

In their own literature and talks, they have included Catholics, moderate Protestants, Buddhists, Wiccans, Hindus, Muslims, Jews, Agnostics, Atheists and psychologists as followers of satanic worship. They also include dream analysis, horoscopes, Tai Chi, hypno-

sis, superhero comic books, Yoga and Zen as pathways to Satan.

One group they particularly attack is Wiccans and other Pagans — Earth-centered, polytheistic and/or Goddess-centered spirituality. As Wiccans, we believe they are targeting us because so few people understand our religion. This makes it unlikely that many will stand in our defense against these hate groups.

The groups, and others like them, would have you believe that Wicca is a part of a satanic conspiracy that is sacrificing pets, praying for the death of Christians and mutilating and murdering children. Yet, according to both local and state authorities there have been no ritual crimes reported in the state in two decades.

One main tenet of Wicca is "An it harm none, do as ye will." Similar to the Christian "Golden Rule," this rede teaches us to love our lives respectfully of others and avoid actions that would harm others directly or indirectly.

In our faith there is no "cosmic bad guy" who we can blame for our mistakes. To us evil begins when we forget that every being is a part of the Divine. One can only abuse a child if one sees

them as a thing rather than a manifestation of the beauty of creation. A rapist must see "his target" as a vehicle for power rather than a child of the Divine. Hitler, and those who helped him, could not have committed such acts of genocide if they had believed in the divinity of all beings.

I am sure there are some people who worship Satan — and some of them may claim to be Wiccan or Pagan. Some of them may even be dangerous people who commit crimes. Yet, to hold Wicca accountable for such actions is like holding all of Christianity accountable for the acts of Jim Jones, David Koresh or dozens of Christians each year who kill children because they thought they were possessed by the devil. There are sick people in every religion. The job of those of us with strong religious beliefs, Christian and Wicca, should be to heal those people — not persecute each other.

Cardinals pick up another weapon via trade

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals completed a long-rumored deal for relief pitcher Dennis Eckersley today, acquiring him from the Oakland Athletics for minor-league reliever Steve Montgomery.

Eckersley, 41, replaces Tom Henke, who announced last month that he would not return for the beginning of the season and likely has retired for good. Henke refused an arbitration offer from St. Louis and could not play for the Cardinals until May 1.

Eckersley is fourth on the career saves list with 323, including 29 last year to lead the Athletics for the ninth straight season.

Capriati pulls out

PARIS (AP) — Jennifer Capriati pulled out of the Paris Open today, just before she was scheduled to play her first competitive match in 15 months.

Capriati said she strained a muscle near her right hip and lower back while practicing earlier in the day.

"I didn't want to push anything and make it worse," she said. "I was really looking forward to playing here. It's very unfortunate. I came all this way and I felt like I was ready. There was nothing I could do. Something like this had to happen."

Seahawks' Smith testifies in vehicular assault trial

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle Seahawks running back Lamar Smith denied Tuesday he deliberately seized an opportunity to blame teammate Chris Warren for the traffic accident that left tackle Mike Frier partially paralyzed.

Smith, on trial for vehicular assault, testified that after he drove his Oldsmobile Bravada into a traffic median and power pole, he told the first police officer to arrive that he was driving.


When another officer told him Warren confessed to being the driver, Smith said, he didn't contradict him because "I didn't know what Chris was thinking."

"I didn't know why he was sticking up for me, so I just decided I wasn't going to say anything different until I could talk to him," Smith told the King County Superior Court jury.

That chance came at the hospital where the men were treated for injuries, and where Pro Bowl runner Warren was arrested. At that point, Smith said, he told the officers, "You're making a big mistake."

Deputy prosecutor Brenda Bannon failed to shake Smith in his account of the evening of Dec. 1, 1994. Prosecutors claim he was both impaired by alcohol and speeding when the accident occurred.

"I was wondering why would Chris take up for me," Smith replied. "I just didn't want to contradict Chris without talking to him."



Injury sidelines Herrig

This week has started poorly for the No. 7 Iowa women's basketball team.

In addition to Sunday's 62-42 loss to No. 23 Purdue, the team learned Tuesday that it will be without the services of freshman center Amy Herrig from two to six weeks because of a leg injury. The fibula pains have escalated since first appearing nearly a week ago, and even forced Herrig to sit out the second half of the Purdue loss. A bone scan Monday showed no fractures.

"I've said all along that I have the

best bench in the country and now it's time for somebody else to step up," head coach Angie Lee said.

Herrig became a starter on the Iowa squad following the season-ending knee injury to Simone Edwards earlier this year. Herrig was averaging 8.0 points per game and 5.8 rebounds a contest with a team-leading field goal percentage of 56 percent.

"The real downer in this is for Amy because she had been playing so well," Lee said.

The injury isn't classified as a stress fracture, but Lee said it's similar in that the muscles surrounding the fibula are very sore and are pulling on the bone. Without rest,

this could create a stress fracture.

This setback couldn't have come at a more inopportune time for the Hawkeyes, who face their toughest test of the season this weekend, hosting No. 9 Penn State Friday night before traveling to Madison, to take on No. 11 Wisconsin Sunday afternoon.

"There is no good time for something like this," Lee said. "Amy's going to miss some crucial games, but even in the worst-case scenario, she should be back and ready for the NCAA tournament."

Lee decided Herrig's replacement in the starting lineup won't be determined until later this week. "The only people I've considered

Hawks conquer Crisler

Millard, Woolridge key Iowa attack

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Iowa coach Tom Davis finally left Crisler Arena smiling Tuesday night.

The 19th-ranked Hawkeyes won at Michigan for the first time in 15 years as Russ Millard had 18 points and a career-best 15 rebounds in a 62-55 victory over the sinking Wolverines.

"We just couldn't get it done through the years," Davis said after his first victory in 10 trips to Ann Arbor. "We came close last year."

That was an 83-82 loss in double overtime. This time, they didn't squander the chance.

Andre Woolridge had 20 points for the Hawkeyes (18-6, 7-5 Big Ten), who won just their second conference road game this season. Iowa's last win in Ann Arbor was a 75-58 victory in 1981. Tuesday night was the last chance for Iowa seniors Kenyon Murray and Mont'ar Gasper, both Michigan natives, to beat the Wolverines in their home state.

"I don't have words to tell how much it means to us," said Murray, who had six points and eight rebounds in 27 minutes. "It means the world to us; it's one of the biggest wins we've had here."

Gasper, who scored six points, said, "It's like beating Iowa for the Iowans."

Michigan's Maurice Taylor scored 16 of his 20 points in the second half as the Wolverines (15-9, 5-6) tried to rally back from a 16-point deficit.

Instead, they lost for the fifth time in six games. Michigan also lost its second straight home game after a 15-game winning streak at Crisler Arena.

Maceo Baston added 12 points for the Wolverines, who fell from the Top 25 this week for the first time this season.

"It's difficult to pull yourself up and move on from this," Michigan coach Steve Fisher said during his very brief postgame comments. "But there's no alternative that's acceptable here."

Iowa, which led 28-17 at half-

time in the low-scoring, sloppily played game, opened up its biggest lead at 38-22 when Millard scored on a feed from Mont'ar Gasper with 13:51 to go.

Michigan got the deficit under double figures with 9:26 remaining when Baston scored on a put-back to make it 43-34.

But the closest the Wolverines could get was a five-point deficit on three occasions, the last when Taylor made his first 3-pointer of

the year to leave his team down 57-52 with 59 seconds left.

Millard and Woolridge combined to make three of four free throws and Woolridge scored on a drive to restore the double-digit lead before Michigan's Dugan Fife made a 3-pointer at the final buzzer.

"When you have a chance to make a play to change the game, you have to make that play," Fisher said. "We haven't done that

with regularity this year."

Iowa shot 43 percent for the game and needed a 53 percent second half to do that. Michigan shot 36 percent.

The Hawkeyes, who lead the Big Ten and rank fourth nationally in rebounding margin, enjoyed a 46-27 advantage on the boards.

Millard, a 6-foot-8 senior center, had eight rebounds at halftime en-

Sandberg psyched for spring training

CHICAGO — Ryne Sandberg doesn't see problems in the bullpen. A potential power shortage? Don't bother him with such a trivial matter.

It's time for spring training and all the positive thoughts that accompany baseball's annual rite of renewal. It begins Wednesday when the New York Yankees become the first team to open camp, and within a week almost every other club will be at work.

For Sandberg, the past and present second baseman for the Chicago Cubs, there never has been a renewal quite like this.

"Offensively, defensively and with the young pitchers we have coming back, I think all the pieces are in place," said Sandberg, who is set to join Chicago pitchers and catchers in Mesa, Ariz., on Wednesday. "I like what I've seen this winter."

Most of all, what many baseball players and fans like is that there's no strike to skew the spring. Last year, replacement players were the only ones in camp early and by the time the regulars reported later, there wasn't much time to work.

"I'm happy about it because it takes away a distraction you really don't need," Texas catcher Ivan Rodriguez said. "It also gives us more time under circumstances that we're all accustomed to, not cramming two months of work into one."

The Cubs were scheduled to officially open their camp to pitchers and catchers on Thursday, along with Houston, Los Angeles, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis and San Francisco.

Among those who now must report earlier than expected is reliever Dennis Eckersley, traded Tuesday from Oakland to St. Louis. Eckersley will be back in the National League for the first time since 1986, when he played with Sandberg for the Cubs.

Roberto Alomar, Ron Gant, Paul Molitor and Jack McDowell are among the many players who have either been traded or signed with new teams during the winter.

Dave Winfield, though, has retired and Don Mattingly and Tom Henke have no plans to

Basketball coach Angie Lee

This week Wayne Drehs interviews first-year women's head basketball coach Angie Lee.

DI: In the beginning of the season, did you ever dream your team would be 20-2, and 11-1 in conference play at this point in the season?

Angie Lee: With all of the things we were trying to go through, I wouldn't have said at this point in time we would have been 20-2. I think that would have been highly, highly optimistic. However, that doesn't take away from the fact that this team has always had the

potential to do that and it's good to see that we are living up to our potential.

DI: Do you think Sunday's 20-point loss to Purdue can be turned into a positive thing?

AL: Absolutely. I think our loss was something that started two weeks ago, because regardless of what the coaching staff did to try to keep them at the top level, they got themselves in a cruise control situation. They felt what they were doing was good enough to get by, so why change it?

DI: If you were an opposing coach preparing to face Iowa, what would be your game plan to beat the Hawkeyes?

AL: I guess if you look at the Purdue game, you would probably go with a zone against us. We haven't proved we can handle a high-pressure zone and I think that would be a real key to slowing us down.

DI: What have been the real keys to your team's success this year?

AL: I truly think the key has been that this team has thrown away all individual goals for team goals. Last year, we were a team of individuals out to get ours, but this season we are willing to give up those individual goals for the sake of the goals we have as a team.

NEWTON, Mass. — Allen Iverson scored 24 points and No. 14 Georgetown got some help from the Boston College timekeeper Tuesday night to beat the 21st-ranked Eagles 66-63.

Georgetown (20-5, 10-4 Big East) snapped a two-game losing streak and three-game road slump that had dropped them out of the Top Ten for the first time this season. The Hoyas had not won at Boston College (15-6, 8-5) since 1991.


Boston College got the rebound and Scoonie Penn fired a desperation 30-footer as the shot clock — which should have had about 30 seconds left — was at 2. George-

No. 10 Virginia Tech 56, Liberty 53
BLACKSBURG, Va. — Damon Watlington hit two 3-pointers in the final minutes as No. 10 Virginia Tech barely escaped with a victory over Liberty after trailing by as many as 11 points in the second half.

Shawn Good had 13 points to lead Virginia Tech (19-2), which might have been caught looking ahead to Saturday's home game against unbeaten and top-ranked Massachusetts, while Travis Jack-

Gaudio embodies Nittany Lions

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Matt Gaudio is the perfect player to symbolize Penn State's emergence from 30 years of basketball mediocrity to national prominence.

He's a hard-nosed player who doesn't have flashy skills, speed or great leaping ability. Despite winning high school player-of-the-year honors in West Virginia, the Mountaineers did not recruit him heavily and many other schools ignored him.


For four years, Gaudio watched as football players were treated like superstars on Penn State's campus, while hoopsters had trouble drawing fans to 7,000-seat Rec Hall. Gaudio even gave up basketball for a year after back surgery.

He came back for his final year of eligibility and now is playing as well as any power forward in the Big Ten. Last week, he led No. 9 Penn State (18-2, 9-2 Big Ten) in scoring in victories over Illinois and Michigan State and made crucial baskets late in both games.

Penn State, ranked for the first time in 30 years, is off to its best start ever and tied with Purdue for first place in the Big Ten. All of a sudden Penn State basketball players are big men on campus and fans are flocking to the new 15,000-seat Bryce Jordan Center.

"It's totally different now," said Gaudio, who was named Big Ten Player of the Week. "We're treated more like the football players. It's exciting for us to see that everyone is excited about us."

After undergoing back surgery in May 1994, Gaudio decided his career was over. Basketball wasn't worth the constant pain and the risk of permanent injury.

He watched from the bench as a student assistant coach as the Nittany Lions went 21-11 and finished third in the NIT. During the season, Gaudio began to think about returning to the team. He was praying about it in church when he heard the priest say, "You get into life what you put into it."

"I really felt the Lord was telling me to play," Gaudio said.

Gaudio admits that before the surgery he didn't do enough stretching, weightlifting or abdominal exercises to strengthen his back. After deciding to return, he dove into rehab, staying on campus during the summer and putting himself through drills with the Penn State football team from 8 a.m. to noon each day.

"It was pretty intense," he said. "Those guys down there work pretty hard. I used to ride my bike down there and there would be some days when I was too tired to ride it back home."

Despite all the work, Gaudio didn't know if he could play in the physical Big Ten until he started scrimmaging.

"That first day of practice I was so excited I had goose bumps," he said.

Banging with 275-pound Phil "Big House" Williams in practice gave Gaudio confidence that his back was fine.

Gaudio is averaging 14 points and nearly 7 rebounds a game, and is Penn State's best low-post scorer.

AIDS IN THE RING

Morrison ref opts to get tested

LAS VEGAS — A day after Tommy Morrison admitted testing positive for the AIDS virus, the referee in his bloody fight with Lennox Lewis calmed his mind by taking an AIDS test of his own that came back negative.

Boxing officials across the country, meanwhile, renewed calls for all states with boxing to test for HIV in the wake of Morrison's test that shook the boxing world.

"I hope we can get a bill passed in California before something major happens in this state, before some documented transmission occurs in a boxing ring," said Richard DeCuir, head of the California Athletic Commission.

The confirmation Monday of Morrison's positive test prompted referee Eric Mills Lane to go to his doctor in Reno, Nev., and have blood drawn to make sure he didn't get the virus. The results came back negative Tuesday.

"My doctor called me about 4:30 today and told me I was absolutely negative," Lane said.

Lane was the third man in the ring in Morrison's Oct. 7 loss to Lennox Lewis in Atlantic City, N.J., in which Morrison was cut around both eyes in the second round and bled much of the way before the fight was finally stopped in the seventh round.

"I had blood all over me," Lane said. "He bled all over me and everyone else."

Lane, a state judge in Reno who has refereed 78 title fights, said he was unaware at the time that New Jersey was one of the many states that don't require boxers to take tests for the AIDS virus. It is not known if Morrison had the virus at the time he fought Lewis.

Lane said he was told by his doctor that there was only an infinitesimal chance he could have gotten the virus in the ring, but wanted to take the test just to make sure.

"I've got a family, I've got a wife and two children," he said. "I'm not really worried but it will make me feel better to know for sure."

While Lane had his AIDS test, Lewis remained at his remote mountain retreat in Jamaica, where promoter Dino Duva said it was very difficult to reach him.

Duva said Lewis is scheduled to be tested for AIDS next month in Britain as part of that country's requirements for his annual boxing license.

"I assume that's what he will do," Duva said. "I don't think he'll rush it. The risk is very small, from what I understand."

Morrison, meanwhile, remained in seclusion in Oklahoma, waiting for results of a second set of tests taken Monday to confirm the Las Vegas test. The results of the latest test were expected today.

Morrison was expected to appear at a news conference in Tulsa on Thursday to discuss the results.

His promoter, Tony Holden, said agents for Morrison and Magic Johnson were arranging a telephone call between the two. Holden said it would likely be a personal discussion of how to deal with the illness and the media attention.

"Magic is probably the best person to talk to him right now," Holden said.

Former heavyweight champion Riddick Bowe said, however, that basketball and boxing are far apart when it comes to an HIV infected athlete being allowed to compete.

"I think it's great for people like Magic Johnson to have the opportu-

nity to come back and play basketball, doing what he does best," Bowe said. "But as far as boxing is concerned, unlike other sports, it's bloody and violent and the risk is far too great for fighters to contract the virus through physical contact. I would not fight someone who is HIV positive. It would just be too great a risk for me, my wife and children."

The aftermath of Morrison's admission affected not only his former opponents and referees, but much of the boxing world as an outcry grew for mandatory AIDS testing of all boxers.

Nevada's top boxing official said he will push to have other states begin testing like Nevada, which has tested some 2,100 boxers since beginning its AIDS program in 1988.

Rockets 121, Mavericks 106





'Braveheart' leads Oscar nominees

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — "Braveheart," actor-director Mel Gibson's battlefield epic about 13th century Scotland, captured a leading 10 Academy Award nominations Tuesday, including best picture.

It will be up against "Apollo 13," "Babe," "Sense and Sensibility," and Italy's "The Postman" for the year's best movie.

Academy voters spread the top bids across a spectrum of titles but shunned some early Oscar favorites.

Massimo Troisi was nominated for best actor in "The Postman," the first posthumous lead acting selection in 20 years. The actor, who died at age 41 just 12 hours after filming ended, also shared a screenwriting credit with four co-writers of the movie.

Also nominated for best actor were Nicolas Cage in "Leaving Las Vegas," Richard Dreyfuss in "Mr. Holland's Opus," Anthony Hopkins in "Nixon" and Sean Penn in "Dead Man Walking."

Emma Thompson was nominated for best actress for "Sense and Sensibility," and for writing the film's script — an Oscar first for an actress. She faces Susan Sarandon in "Dead Man Walking," Elisabeth Shue in "Leaving Las Vegas," Sharon Stone in "Casino" and Meryl Streep in "The Bridges of Madison County."

"Apollo 13" collected nine nominations and "Babe" and "Sense and Sensibility" each got seven. The best picture nomination for "The Postman" was the first foreign-language nominee in the top category since Ingmar Bergman's "Cries and Whispers" in 1973. No foreign-language film has ever taken the best picture statuette.

The best picture nominations encompass a broad range of stories: "Braveheart" is a bloody epic about Scottish rebellion; "Apollo 13" retells the harrowing true story of astronauts trapped in a dying spacecraft; "Sense and Sensibility" is a lush period film exploring unrequited — and eventually requited — love; "The Postman" is about the unexpected friendship of

an exiled Chilean poet and a mail carrier in a remote town; and "Babe" is a computer-enhanced adaptation of the children's barnyard book "Babe, the Gallant Pig."

"The little pig has gone a long way," said "Babe's" barnyard straight man, James Cromwell, who received a best supporting actor nomination.

Some films once considered favorites did poorly in the voting by the 5,043 voters of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. "The American President" collected just one nomination, as did "The Bridges of Madison County" and "Casino."

Tom Hanks, winner of the last two best actor Oscars for "Philadelphia" and "Forrest Gump," will not have a chance for his third straight. "Apollo 13" failed to launch a third consecutive bid.

Even though "Leaving Las Vegas" was not picked for best pic-

ture, as was widely expected, director Mike Figgis was nominated for best director. He faces Gibson, "Babe's" Chris Noonan, "The Postman's" Michael Radford and actor Tim Robbins, who directed "Dead Man Walking."

The supporting acting nominees are first-time Oscar honorees: James Cromwell in "Babe," Ed Harris in "Apollo 13," Brad Pitt in "12 Monkeys," Tim Roth in "Rob Roy" and Kevin Spacey in "The Usual Suspects."

Joan Allen was nominated for best supporting actress for "Nixon" as was Kathleen Quinlan for "Apollo 13," Mira Sorvino in "Mighty Aphrodite," Mare Winningham for "Georgia" and Kate Winslet for "Sense and Sensibility."

The Netherlands' "Antonia's Line" was nominated for foreign

language film, where it faces Sweden's "All Things Fair," Algeria's "Dust of Life," Brazil's "O Quatrilho" and Italy's "The Star Maker."

"The Postman" was not in the running in this category because it was released in Italy in 1994.

Troisi's posthumous nomination for the 68th annual awards puts the late Italian actor in select Oscar company. The last posthumous best actor nominee was Peter Finch, who won in 1976 won for "Network." Other posthumous nominees include James Dean, Spencer Tracy and, for best supporting actor, Sir Ralph Richardson.

Woody Allen, nominated for writing "Mighty Aphrodite," tied filmmaker Billy Wilder for most career nominations for screenplay, with 12.

'Postman' nomination: A bittersweet victory

LOS ANGELES — Italian comic actor Massimo Troisi barely lived long enough to finish "The Postman," let alone see it win international accolades.

Today, a year and half after Troisi died at age 41, "The Postman" received an Oscar nomination for best picture. Troisi was nominated both for best actor and for co-writing the story of an Italian mail carrier's unusual friendship with Chilean poet Pablo Neruda.

The nominations were particularly unusual. Until today, a foreign-language film had not been nominated for best picture since Ingmar Bergman's "Cries and Whispers" in 1973. The last posthumous nomination for a leading actor came 20 years ago, for Peter Finch in 1976's "Network."

"It's more than a triumph. I still don't believe it," Maria Grazia Cucinotta, who played Troisi's dark-haired, sensual sweetheart in the film, told the Italian news agency ANSA. "If he deserved it (it was because) he made this film with his heart."

Troisi suffered from heart problems since childhood and died in June 1994, less than 12 hours after he finished work on the film. Due to his declining health, Troisi looked frail in several sections of the film and was forced to sit in numerous scenes. He rarely could work more than an hour a day.

The film was not eligible for a foreign-language Oscar nomination because it was released in Italy in 1994. Italy did not submit "The Postman" as the country's official entry that year, reportedly because director Michael Radford is British. "L'America" was entered instead.

Yet "The Postman" qualified for this year's feature-length Oscars because it was released in the United States in 1995.

"We're feeling a mix of crossed emotions," Troisi's sister, Rosaria Troisi, told the Italian news agency ANSA. "It's a very great satisfaction, but satisfaction doesn't signify joy. What can I say. We're smack in the middle of an emotional storm. I can say that Massimo has given another happy moment to all those he already gave joy to. We're proud."

Gabe's to open music box of ear candy with Jack Logan

Hey, hey, all you music lovers out there — have I got a Valentine for you!

Jack Logan appears tonight at Gabe's, touring hot on the heels of his latest release, *Mood Elevator*, on the Medium Cool label. Logan is a Midwestern guy, straight out of southern Illinois, but he's a long way from small-town dimensions now.

Last year, Logan's surge into the media limelight was thanks in part to four-star reviews of both his albums: *Mood Elevator* and 1994's *Bulk* in magazines like *Rolling Stone*, *Billboard*, and *Musican*. In an age when artists are fattening their musical palette with everything from harpsichord to oboe, Logan's formula is deceptively simple and stunningly effective: play simple songs well.

Logan developed this formula deep in the heart of Georgia, where he had moved and was working as a swimming pool pump-motor mechanic. Logan's work grabbed the attention of local folks like REM's Peter Buck and the Dashboard Saviors, who passed word

along to Peter Jespersen, head of Medium Cool/Twin Tone Records. Under pressure from these powers, Logan reluctantly picked his favorite 42 songs and packed them onto *Bulk*, a two-hour, two-CD chunk of lo-fi, straightforward raw music.

In an age when artists are fattening their musical palette with everything from harpsichord to oboe, Logan's formula is deceptively simple and stunningly effective: play simple songs well.

The new album, *Mood Elevator*, is no less straightforward, though it is shorter. Its sound is less rough, less like a homemade 4-track and more complete. Recorded in a barn-cum-studio, the album is like walking quickly through a mall — sort of. Each new space is filled with different stuff, you look around for a minute, then you move on. The lyrics are sparse: just enough to

suggest a situation rather than to spell it out and analyze it. A perfect example is "What Was Burned," which details the aftermath of a fire. The chorus unsentimentally states "Some faulty wiring/Has left you desiring what was burned." What caused the fire? Is this literal? Is this metaphorical? Logan suggests that it doesn't matter, that what matters is the situation itself and immediate response.

Logan's music falls somewhere between Paul Westerberg and the Connells. While weary, he's not as sardonic as Westerberg. While at times jangly and dripping with harmony, he's not as lush as the Connells. You might say he's a little hard to define. And then you'd realize that he's worth trying to define, that if you didn't care, he wouldn't be the musician he is.

You'll get your chance to get a handle on Jack Logan tonight at Gabe's. He's appearing with the band that made *Mood Elevator*, Liquor Cabinet. From all reports, Logan live is a little unpredictable, swerving from lounge act to grunge god. Need something sweet tonight? Forget the heart-shaped cookies. Go for ear candy.





Hoffmaster said more than the sun sign (traditional newspaper horoscopes) is needed. You have to use the whole Astro Cartography chart.

"The point is, you can't take elements alone and make an assessment,"

Hoffmaster said.

Hoffmaster said you have to analyze all of the elements as a whole to understand the makeup of each person's psyche.

"I can look at things in the chart to find more than likely where the difficulties are," Hoffmaster said.

Vedic Astrology takes the zodiac as a whole and divides it into 13-degree increments.

"The important thing is to find a professional astrologer vs. a psychic," Hoffmaster said.

Hoffmaster said there are a lot of phonies in the Astrological field.

"When I have a client come to me, I don't want them to tell me about their lives, I should be able to tell them facts," Hoffmaster said.

He believes there is scientific proof to Astrology.

"Some people come to me for relationships, as long as I have all the elements, I can make assessments," Hoffmaster said.

In order to do this you need certain elements, like location of the birth, time of the birth and birth date.

sense of self or status desire for achievement," Hoffmaster said.

It is said not to mix the two different schools of astrology, East and West, Hoffmaster said.

Western Astrologist Margaret Anderson said that the difference between Western and Eastern Astrology is a technical difference.

"They are interpreted in different ways. They both work well and it's a matter of technique," Anderson said.

People also are compatible with somebody within their own element.

Anderson said the water nourishes the earth and is compatible elements the same as fire with air.

"I think Valentine's Day has become a much bigger holiday than when I was younger," Coleman said.





National Condom Week has arrived — and Iowa City has rolled out the red latex to celebrate Valentine's Day.

Sharon Elmore, a community program assistant for the Emma Goldman Clinic for Women, said the clinic's condom sales will rise this week due to a special promotion running through today.

"We will be selling a dozen red condoms and a carnation for \$2.00," she said. "A condom substitute is available for people who are allergic to the red dye. (Or), you can substitute bags that have two dental dams, latex gloves and lubricant."

The clinic stocked up on about 100 dozen condoms for the promotion, Elmore said.

"Last year we sold out on the promotion," she said. "I think condom awareness has increased in the last five years."

Cindy Montgomery, a practicum student at Iowa Community AIDS Resource and Education (ICARE), said they have sheathed activities planned for their open house today from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., which attracted 125 people last year.

"We will also have refreshments, a condom quiz with a prize if you get 90 percent of the questions right, maybe a big jar of condoms where you have to guess how many there are and, of course, Captain Condom will be there."

Captain Condom, UI senior Chris Chanavier, said he got interested in the character because of his major, but hasn't worn the costume yet.

"My major is health promotion," he said. "My first ordeal will be on Feb. 14. I knew a teacher who wanted volunteers and I got involved."

Chanavier said he has a way to change people's minds who

refuse to wear condoms.

"I would try to educate them so they're smart enough to make a decision," he said. "Getting out the information so people know."

Montgomery said people who don't use condoms have to look at the situation from a different perspective.

"We saw 86 (HIV positive) clients last year, and 30 are active, meaning we see them on a regular basis," she said. "People who don't use condoms endanger the people they have relationships with."

UI Sophomore Julie Melcher said she appreciates the condom dispensers in the dorms and in her experience, the guy has provided the condom.

"With as many sexually transmitted diseases as there are, people need to take responsibility," she said. "The responsibility should be equal, one shouldn't rely on the other to provide it."

Splendid weather aids rose crop

SAN JOSE, Calif. — When roses are red, growers aren't blue.

Last year's gloomy skies took the bloom out of California's rose crop, but this winter's brighter weather has growers seeing green for Valentine's Day.

"Fantastic" is how grower Dave Kitayama describes this year's crop of Valentine roses. Sunny skies helped produce vigorous plants with deeply-hued red, pink and peach blossoms.

"The quantity is above average, but it's the quality of flowers that is also very, very good right now," said Kitayama, co-owner of Kitayama Brothers Inc. of Union City, the nation's

largest grower of roses.

"Last year I wasn't really proud of the crop. ... This year it's different."

California, with its favorable climate, produces nearly 70 percent of the nation's roses, with most nurseries concentrated in Santa Cruz, Monterey, San Mateo and San Diego counties.



The state last year produced nearly \$62.6 million in hybrid tea roses, the favored elegant type that makes up virtually all cut roses consumers buy, according to the California Cut Flower Commission.

And Valentine's Day remains the biggest day, so growers keep an eye on the weather during the critical seven or eight weeks before the flowers are picked for the holiday.







Homemade cards big at correctional facility

DES MOINES — Gladys Burkhead got an early start on her valentines this year. October.

"Last year I had to make a lot of them in January; I almost didn't get done," she said.

The homemade cards are ready to go again, 370 of them piled in a big box that Burkhead, 89, can barely move. The cards will go to people she has never met, not that she hasn't tried.

For 20 years, Burkhead has made valentines for every single inmate at the Iowa Correctional Institute for Women at Mitchellville.

"They need something to brighten up their lives," she said. "Every woman likes to get a valentine. It's the nicest card you get.

"You expect cards on Christmas, you expect it on Mother's Day, but it's a surprise on Valentine's Day. A lot of people send Christmas cards because they have to. Nobody sends a valentine because they

have to."

Burkhead said she decided to cheer up prisoners because they need it and as a statement on the prison system.

"I have a lot of sympathy for the poor girls that get sent to prison," she said. "Most of them are pretty good girls. They're not bad girls. They've just done bad things." There are "better ways" of dealing with the nonviolent criminals than putting them behind bars, she said.

Burkhead doesn't buy packages of valentines with warm and sticky messages.

Instead, each is homemade from discarded greeting cards and construction paper. "People know I do this, so they bring me their old cards.

"I have a penchant for taking something that's useless and making it into something," she said.

"I use just about any kind of card except a sympathy card; they're awfully dull."

She cuts and pastes the old cards to make new ones, giving most a scalloped border. Most also have red hearts, either drawn or cut and pasted into place. Few have messages and none are signed.

"When you're younger, holidays are all so exciting," O'Neill said.


"But when you're older, they remind you of what you don't have instead of what you should be happy about."

Brown University on quest for ideal gift

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — Have you ever sent an anonymous love note? How spicy do you like your taco sauce? Are you more like a limousine or a sports car? What do you prefer to drink at 9 p.m. — cola, coffee, water or wine?

College students today face some difficult questions.

That's why a group of students at Brown University has been asking some easy ones just in time for Valentine's Day.

More than 1,500 of Brown's 5,600 undergraduate students have filled out a survey asking 33 questions, including the ones above. A computer is using the answers to match students up according to compatibility — or lack thereof.

"Fifteen hundred people don't do anything (together) at Brown," said Rajib Chanda,

chairman of Helping Undergraduates Socialize (HUGS). "Not football, not dances — people here are very individualistic."

Datelessness is almost a tradition at Brown, said Chanda, from Lawrenceville, N.J. He and others in student government formed HUGS last November, believing students busy with their studies, internships and career plans needed help dating.

"Groups at Brown tend to be very segregated — by race, sexual orientation, fraternities — and people don't interact outside their groups," Chanda said. "The manifestation is that no one dates."

Toby Simon, dean of student life for 14 years, agrees that lofty career goals make dating difficult, but says attitudes have also changed.

"I don't think dating is as alive and well," she said.





 Prep: 15 min., Cook: 10 min.
 1/4 lb. ramen noodles, flavor packet discarded
 3 Tbs. soy sauce
 1 Tb. cornstarch
 1 tsp. sugar
 1 lb. stir-fry beef
 1 tsp. vegetable oil
 1 tsp. Oriental sesame oil
 2 tsp. fresh ginger, minced
 1 clove garlic, minced
 1 cup scallions, chopped
 1/4 lb. mushrooms, chopped
 3/4 lb. frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained, or fresh, chopped

Cook ramen noodles in a large pot of boiling salted water 3-4 minutes or until al dente. Drain thoroughly. Set aside and keep warm. Combine next 3 ingredients in a jar with a tight fitting lid. Shake vigorously. Place sliced beef in a mixing bowl. Pour marinade over beef and toss to coat. Heat vegetable and sesame oil in a wok or heavy nonstick skillet over high heat. Serve over noodles with additional soy sauce if desired.






